The Rockefeller have enormously increased their holdings of railroad stock during the past two years is no secret among the big financiers and stock manipulators of New York. John D. Rockefeller's greatest source of income is from Standard Oil, which yields him, according to a recent estimate considered reliable, from \$22,000,000 to \$25,000,000 a year or about \$2,000,000 a month. His income from other sources is about half as much, making a total of about \$35,000,000 a year. With such a stupendous income, he is naturally on the outlook for profitable investments, for which railroads offer an inviting field, and he and a few men associated with him—W. K. Vanderbilt, James Stillman, Standard Oil magnates Flagler and Rogers and J. D. Rockefeller's son and brother, not to mention George Gould—are lately acquiring a tremendous foothold in the railroad world. It was noticed that not long ago when the New York Central desired to negotiate for a small temporary loan of \$5,000,000, it was not through J. P. Morgan, who has hitherto managed that great road's financial affairs, but through James Stillman, banker-in-chief to King Rockefeller. And Mr. Stillman recently became a director of that road. J. D. Rockefeller does not take to the position of railroad director himself, but in most cases uses a representative for that purpose. It is believed in Wall street that the Rockefeller "crowd" is securing a dominant interest not only in the New York Central, but in other great lines. Wall street financiers, according to one of the best informed men in New York, estimate the Rockefeller holdings, in stocks and bonds as follows: Missouri, Kansas & Texas, \$45,000,000; Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, \$30,000,000; New York Central, \$25,000,000; Missouri Pacific, \$18,000,000; New York, New Haven & Hartford, \$15,000,000; Delaware, Lackawanna & Western, \$12,000,000; Lake Shore, \$10,000,000; other roads, \$43,000,000; total, \$198,000,000. It will be noticed that all these are high class roads and big money makers. In the directorate of most of them William Rockefeller represents the family interest. He is a multi-millionaire himself, and of more of an active turn for such business than his elder brother. Young John D. is a director of the M. K. & T. and D. & L. These, it will be observed, are mostly Vanderbilt roads, and it is surmised that Rockefeller intends to succeed Vanderbilt as the great railroad magnate of the east. At present the Standard Oil people are directly and heavily interested in about twenty-five thousand miles of railroad, and this keen observer says that with their unequalled money power the Rockefellers are moving irresistibly to the front in the railroad field. If this be true, why should they not move westward and northwestward, "irresistibly?" If they are at the back of Mr. Harriman, what is to stop him from finally gaining everything in sight in the railroad world that he desires? Great indeed is Rockefeller; but some day the people will at once discover that they are greater than he, and that they can benefit themselves by exercising for themselves the power which he now so largely exercises for himself.—Oregon Journal.
