He asked, as a last request, that the gamblers refund the money he had lost to his wife in order that she would be able to clear up the matter at the bank. It has been customary in Portland for some time to require the gamblers to refund money to the wives of men who lost whenever the woman interested made a complaint about it but it is a question whether such a precedent is a good one. Every time a weak minded man loses money to a gambling table which should have gone to the support of his family and that money is refunded to the man's wife, it encourages sundry other weak creatures to stake their mite, in the hope of beating the gambler, because they will reason that if they lose perhaps their wives can get the money, or part of it refunded. When two men sit down at a gambling table each expects to beat the other and when the professional wins (as he generally does) and is forced to refund the money it looks like pretty good evidence that the game is looked upon as not square or that gambling is in itself a crime. If either or both of these propositions are true it would look better on the part of the Portland authorities to suppress the evil altogether rather than to license it and then force the gambler to refund in certain cases.
