IMPORTANCE OF THE PORTAGE.

No other question which at this time claims the attention of the people of Eastern Oregon is of such prime importance as is that of the opening of the Columbia river to navigation at the falls of Celilo. Every material interest of the producers and business men of the Inland Empire is centered in this proposition. As conditions now exist the business of the entire section is placed at the mercy of a single transportation corporation and the freight rates are fixed with the single idea of "what the traffic will bear." At the last regular session of the legislature a law was enacted providing for the construction of a portage road and carrying with it an appropriation which was then believed to be adequate for the construction and equipment of the road. A board of portage commissioners, consisting of the governor, secretary of state and attorney general was appointed to take charge of the construction of the road and it was fondly hoped by the people east of the Cascades that the road would be built and the longed for relief given within a year from the passage of the act. At about the time it was expected work would commence on the portage road, however, a governmental canal project was sprung (whether or not at the instigation of the railroad people we are not prepared to say) and the portage commissioners saw fit to abandon the portage proposition and devote their energies to the work of securing right-of-way for the canal. While, no doubt, a canal and locks will be the ultimate solution of the Celilo problem, even the most sanguine friends of that plan can not reasonably hope for relief from that source within much less than 20 years. Every man who has given the matter serious consideration must agree that the only practical present day solution of the problem is a portage road and if the people who have pioneered the Inland Empire and who have borne the brunt of developing a new country expect to derive any benefit from an open river during their lifetime they must insist on the next legislature taking such action on this important matter as will insure the immediate construction of the portage road.

The entire transportation question as it is related to this section of Oregon hinges on an open river and the people of Gilliam county may as well quit talking or thinking railroad until the river problem is solved. We all know that the O. R. & N. holds the key to this part of the country and as long as they control the situation and get every pound of freight at Arlington we need not expect them to incur the expense of building a road to accommodate the people. Railroad corporations are not built that way. A portage road, however, would force the railroad people to build because if we had an open river we would never haul our freight to Arlington and then turn it over to the railroad. We would patronize the river every time.

This question is a purely business proposition but it is one which is closely allied with the coming election. If the people of this section desire a portage road, reduced freight rates and better transportation facilities all round they should make this an issue in the campaign. They should canvass the matter and decide on men for legislative positions who are not only known to be warm supporters of the immediate construction of the portage road but who also seem best qualified to make a winning fight for that project. This is not a political proposition. It is strictly a business measure and it closely affects the pocketbook of every citizen. Every voter should study this question and vote for a portage road on the 6th of June.

The time of Judge Bradshaw is fully occupied with his court duties so that he has no time whatever to look after the interests of his campaign. It is not likely, however, that this fact will reduce his usual big majority in the district for the people admire a man who puts in his time attending the work which he was elected to perform and his past record as an upright and just judge is the best endorsement any man can have.

Popular Ocean Beach.

Many of the Interior planning to spend their vacation at the Sea Shore.

Hundreds from Eastern Oregon and Washington spent their vacation at North (Long) Beach, Wash., last summer and it is safe to say that this popular resort of the North Pacific Coast will be visited by many more this year than ever within its history. The change from a high and dry interior altitude to the sea level is most beneficial. The trip on the Willamette and Columbia rivers, out of Portland, is one long to be remembered, the usual heat of a summer afternoon being tempered by a gentle breeze freighted with the aroma of pine trees and seasoned with salt sea air. The scenery includes much that is beautiful. Leaving Portland on one of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company's palatial river steamers, (the T. J. Potter being the queen of river flyers) the excursionist is carried through the waters where fly the flags of many nations. The twelve miles on the Willamette river are quickly made, and, after saluting the government light house marking the junction of the two rivers, the boat swings into the Columbia for the trip to Astoria. The morning is clear (generally so from June until September), and a magnificent and inspiring sight meets the eye as the sweep around the bend is made—five snow capped peaks, Mount Hood, Mount Adams, Mount Saint Helens, Mount Bachelor and Mount Jefferson, looming into view—a sight worth traveling thousands of miles to see. On down the picturesque river, past villages, saw mills, fishing boats, salmon canneries, perpendicular damlike structures and rocky hillsides farms, the boat pursues its way. The majestic sweep of the river is awe-inspiring. Gradually the shores grow farther apart and, scarcely realizing that the five hours have been consumed in making the trip, the boat steams alongside the wharf at Astoria.

One hour from Astoria, through the famous fishing waters of the Columbia, past scores of salmon traps and nets and as many white stream fish boats, lands the passengers at Iwaco, on Baker's Bay where connection for beach points is made with trains of the Iwaco Railway & Navigation Company, whose cars stand on the wharf awaiting the steamer. North Beach, where the surf bathing is unexcelled, at low tide is from 200 to 400 feet wide, twenty-three miles long and so compact that a carriage or wagon scarcely leaves a trace upon it. Scattered along the beach are hundreds of cottages and hotels in which summer life is an unceasing round of pleasure from the opening to the closing of the season. The much dreaded "Resort Moequito" is unknown and no venomous snakes or insects are found. The thermometer rarely goes below 50 degrees in July or August, but light overcoats, fine morning and evening and blankets at night are comfortable during the season.

Rates for accommodations at North Beach points are reasonable and vary to suit the visitor. At European hotels and lodging houses rooms range from twenty five cents to one dollar a day; at restaurants, meals run from twenty-five to fifty cents; and at the American-plan hotels, the charges range from one dollar a day to two dollars and upward. Dozens of delightful side trips may be taken from the beach into a country of wild and picturesque beauty, quiet and secluded among hills and forest, with hunting and fishing in native haunts; to the United States Life Saving stations and light house—cranberry farms, oyster beds, salmon fishing grounds and canneries.
