

A BUSINESS PROPOSITION.

In another column of this impression will be found a signed letter from Mr. Bowerman in which he defines his position on the portage road question and clearly states what his course will be regarding the same if elected joint senator.

As stated in this column last week the GLOBE believes the early completion of a portage road at Celilo to be of greater importance to the material interests of the people of Eastern Oregon than any other question which is now before them for settlement. It is not a question of politics or of sentiment. It is a clear cut business proposition which directly affects the pocket book of every producer and consumer of the Inland Empire.

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Mr. Bowerman comes out clearly in a signed statement, and gives his views on this question and tells the people just what they may expect him to work for if they elect him. He is an avowed republican and has given a pledge which self interest, common sense, personal honor and every other consideration which might be urged will compel him to make good.

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As stated above there is neither politics nor sentiment in this question. It is a matter of business to the people and the GLOBE goes into this matter as it does because it believes that by so doing it will best serve the material interests of Gilliam county and Eastern Oregon.

The office of district judge is not a political one and it should be so understood by the voters. What would be thought of a judge who would allow political considerations to influence his decisions while on the bench, who would allow a criminal to escape a just punishment for his crime because he belonged to the same political party with which the judge affiliated or conspired to punish an innocent man because he belonged to the opposite political party?

Rev. Father Hendricks, of the Catholic Missionary Union of New York, is delivering a series of interesting lectures in the court house this week. His first lecture, delivered Tuesday evening on the "Origin and end of the World" was listened to attentively by the largest audience that ever gathered in Condon at a similar meeting.

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At a meeting of the Celebration committee Monday evening it was decided not to celebrate on the coming Fourth but instead to arrange for a series of races and ball games beginning June 20th, and ending July 2nd. When more definite arrangements are completed further announcements will be made.
