The Ball Game.

Sunday was an ideal day for base ball and the Condon public showed their appreciation of the game and weather by turning out en masse to enjoy the game between Fossil and Condon. The grand stand was filled and many spectators were on the outside where they could have more room to give vent to their enthusiasm as their favorites scored a point.

The game was called at 2:30 p.m. with Fossil at bat. Condon made short work of the visitors, however, and speedily shut them out without a run. This performance was repeated in every inning until the seventh when the Fossil boys shook themselves together and scored four runs. The eight was another water haul for Fossil but in the ninth Kennedy scored again making them five.

In the first Condon scored four good runs, in the third they added two to the list, in the fifth another was tallied and in the eighth they took another spurt and piled up four more making them 11. At no time was the game close enough to be thrillingly interesting but it was good, clean ball all the way through and the spectators enjoyed it.

It is due the Fossil boys to say that they worked under a decided disadvantage. The new battery they have been expecting did not show up and it is safe to say that the team expected the outcome of the game to be just as it was. They showed their mettle, however, by standing fire and took their defeat in good part as thorough sportsmen always should.

Dr. Kennedy, of Arlington, wore the Fossil mask and his work belied the bat was all right and it is safe to say that no 16-year-old boy in the two counties could have discounted young Rinehart's work as pitcher. All he needs is a few years age and more experience to make a ball player of first rank.

Fossil's fielding was poor and more than half of the team utterly failed to find Jarvis when at the bat.

The Condon boys all did good work. Jarvis and Parker, the iron clad battery, were in good form and every player was "Johnny-on-the-spot."

W. Snover and Edward Dunn were selected as managers at the meeting and Jim Barnes and G. A. Berry were elected secretary and treasurer respectively.

At a meeting of the board of managers held later in the day D. B. Parker was chosen as captain and he will act as the third member of the board of managers. The ball team is now in good condition and the boys feel able to hold their place at the head of the procession against all comers.

States His Position.

To the Editor:

In your issue of the 19th inst. is an editorial on the importance of the portage road which suggests to the voters the advisability of making the immediate construction of the portage road an issue in the coming election of legislative candidates.

I feel that your remarks are timely and have no hesitancy in stating my views on this subject and defining what my course will be if elected.

I believe we should have had this road constructed long before this; that as soon as the portage is in operation we will have a material reduction in freight rates on the products we raise and the goods we consume, and that the saving in freight in one year on wheat alone will more than pay the whole cost of the road.

I believe that the immediate construction of the portage road is of more personal interest to the voters of this district than any other matter that is now being discussed politically here.

If I am elected I will do all in my power to secure the legislation necessary to insure the immediate construction and operation of the portage road.
