Death of Mrs. Downer.

Mrs. Rhoda Downer, widow of the late D. C. Downer, died suddenly at her home in this city Tuesday morning as the result of a fall she sustained Monday evening by which her left leg was broken in two places. Death was caused by an uretic spasm brought on by the shock of the fall and came almost instantly and without pain. A moment before the final spasm she was chatting with those who were with her and the end came without warning.

Rhoda M. Davidson was born at Rochester, N. Y., September 18, 1827. While yet a small child her parents moved to Michigan where she grew to womanhood and she was married to D. C. Downer in the year 1845. In 1852 Mr. and Mrs. Downer crossed the plains to California and remained in that state until 1878 when they came to Oregon. Deceased was a pioneer of Eastern Oregon having resided in this section of the state for 25 years. She was a consistent member of the Church of Christ and was universally loved and respected by a large circle of friends and acquaintances.

Three children, H. F. and J. E. Downer and Mrs. James M. Brown, all highly respected citizens of this county, and two sisters, Mrs. E. H. Lathrop, of San Jose, California, and Mrs. Eliza Hughes, of Inlay City, Michigan, survive her.

The funeral was held yesterday afternoon the service being conducted by Elder Swift of the Church of Christ.

Farmer's Meeting.

Farmers and stockmen should bear in mind the date set for the meeting of farmers which will be held in the court house next Saturday, June 4, at 2 o'clock p.m. The purpose of the meeting is to organize for mutual protection and benefit and it is to the advantage of every farmer and stockman to be present.

In connection with this movement it may be of interest to many of our readers to know that the farmers of Umatilla county are organizing in a similar manner. Their principal object is the pooling of their wheat crop. They argue that the wheat growers have secured better prices by pooling their product and that the same will be true of the wheat growers when properly organized. Their plan of procedure is as follows:

With the association formed the members would pool all their wheat or any part of their holdings. The association would then agree upon a certain day upon which this wheat would be offered for sale to the highest bidder. The sales day would be advertised sufficiently so that all buyers who might wish to bid for the pool could be present. The Umatilla wheat market is controlled by the export price and it is believed that if a large pool was offered for sale at specified dates the exporters could make arrangements for handling it and thereby insure cargo in which event they could pay a better price for the wheat.

The plan looks feasible and is worthy the attention of Gilliam county farmers.

New Railroad Scheme.

A special from La Grande to Oregonian says:

Articles of incorporation have been filed for the Oregon & Idaho Short Line Railroad Company, with R. W. Baxter, F. S. Stanley and H. T. Hendryx incorporators.

The objects of this company are to construct and operate a railroad from a point on the Columbia River accessible to river steamboats, through the lower John Day coal district, via Condon, Fossil and the great wheat belt bordering the Blue Mountain range, and ultimately connecting with the Oregon Short Line at or near Nampa, Idaho.

This project offered needed transportation for the coal interests which are becoming famous on the Lower John Day. It is also a very feasible and short route for the O. R. & N. to reach the Columbia River after leaving the Snake, without crossing any drainage system as the line would follow the basin of the John Day low gap opening into the Barni River basin, thus practically circumventing the three high divides now passed over by the O. R. & N. at Meacham, Telocast and Pleasant Valley.

The company is acting for Eastern capitalists. The enterprise has taken such favorable form that the work is to be pressed on the coal deposits.

Mission Closes.

The course of lectures delivered in the circuit court room last week by Rev. Father Hendricks, of the Catholic Missionary Union, of New York, closed Sunday evening. The subject chosen by the speaker for his closing discourse was, "The Question of the Law of the Gospel Answered," the text being "What must I do to be saved." The lecture was perhaps the best of the series and in his closing periods the Father displayed a degree of eloquence and rhetoric which is rarely equalled by any pulpit orator. The exercises were at once beautiful and impressive the entire service being sung or chanted by Father Gibbons, whose trained and well modulated voice is perfectly suited to this solemn service.

Norman Williams found Guilty.

The Williams murder trial at The Dalles, came to a close last Friday evening at 8 o'clock, the jury at that hour returning a verdict of murder in the first degree. The case has attracted widespread attention. The crime for which Williams was convicted was the murder of Alma Nesbitt and her mother in Hood River valley about four years ago. The evidence in the case, while entirely circumstantial, was so strong that the jury returned the verdict in two hours.
