Murdered at Baker.

Rutherford B. Halstead, a son of Mrs. Halstead, of this city, was shot and almost instantly killed by Llewellyn Legg at Baker City last Thursday evening.

The shooting was the outcome of an altercation which occurred in a restaurant shortly before. From information received here it seems that Legg commenced to abuse Mrs. Lahey, proprietor of the restaurant, and Halstead interfered in the woman's behalf. Words brought on blows and after the men had both left the restaurant the shooting occurred on the street. One report stated that Halstead was the aggressor and that Legg fired in self defense and that he could only be held on a charge of manslaughter but a later report which says that Legg was held on a charge of murder in the first degree seems to discredit the former story. All reports from there agree that Halstead had the reputation of being a quiet, peaceable man.

Word of the tragedy reached here Friday and instructions were wired to Baker to send the remains here for burial. This was done and the body reached here Sunday afternoon the funeral being held Tuesday at two o'clock.

Deceased was a member of the Fraternal order of Eagles, at Baker, and that order held appropriate services before the remains were sent here and accompanied the body to the train. He was about 25 years old.

His aged mother, two sisters, Mrs. J. M. Cameron and Mrs. F. W. Moore and three brothers, Herbert Halstead, of this place, and Harry and Bert Halstead of Grant county survive him. The two latter were notified by wire. Herbert Halstead and family were enjoying an outing at Hood River when the tragedy occurred and it was only by reading a short account of the murder in a Portland paper that they were apprised of the sad affair. Mr. Halstead verified the story by wiring to Baker and at once left for Condon arriving here Sunday evening. Much sympathy is expressed for the relatives by their many friends here.

Fossil will practice up during the week and play a return game on the Condon diamond next Sunday.
