Close But O. K. The ball game last Sunday was close but in the final wind-up it was, as usual, O. K. for Condon. Fossil came over with great gobs of gas in her eye and a firmly fixed determination to "do" Condon to a bitter and terrible finish. Three times had her colors gone down in defeat before the indomitable Reds and three several times had she suffered from virulent attacks of disgust to think that this should be thus and that Victory should, for so many moons, refrain from perching on her banner. In fact it was "up to" Fossil to win this game—if she could—but she couldn't, or at least didn't, although the Reds had but one tally the best of it when the game ended with a score of 7 to 8. Fossil had reinforced her team with four Portland players which strengthened her lineup in a marked degree, and the fact that Collins was sick and unable to play and Block was tripped in the first inning and had to play the game out on one leg, weakened the Condon team as to equalize matters and make the game a close and interesting one. Fossil went first to the bat and the first inning proved to be a water haul for both teams. In the second the visitors again rolled up a goose egg while Condon, following, jacked off six big tallies, each spelled with a capital F. Then things happened. There was no Quaker meeting in the grand stand nor on the benches. The spirit moved every body to "moller" and they did the act in unison. It was a great exhibition of lung power and unbridled enthusiasm. The Condon girl was in her glory. She was at her best in both looks and voice and every Condon fan loved her for her looks, adored her for herself and worshipped her for the way she cheered the crack ball team of Eastern Oregon. In the third and fourth there was no body hurt and no tallies made but both sides played ball right up to the hilt.
