Again Fossil Wins.

It is hardly worth while to mention the game played here last Sunday.

The next game will be played this afternoon to be followed by another to-morrow and, unless somebody wins two straight, the rub Saturday and the Condon fans devoutly hope the result will be somewhat different.

Speaking of Sunday's game, however, Condon got skinned fair and that's all there is to it. Three-six was the score and the victors packed off the even half dozen. Barring their error list which was considerable and their batting which was mediocre, Condon put up a good game but these things killed them off.

Hall, on third, was again unfortunate with one of his wild throws to first which gave Fossil a big tally and allowed the batter to bag three bases.

Collins and Cornell each fumbled a fly and Cornell lost his scalp by taking desperate chances on bases when not forced. Barnard and Jerry Jarvis who have been reckoned as standbys at the bat, failed to make good and instead of the two and three sackers, home runs and big, elegant tallies that they used to be able to brag about they rolled out, and put on exhibition, a full row of goose eggs.

It was very sad. Jorman was in the box for Condon and St. John, lately signed from Goldendale, wore the mask. Jorman pitched a way up game fanning an even dozen of Fossil's favorites as against 11 Reds struck out by Myers, who twirled the swine-skin sphere for Fossil.

Jorman made the Fossiles work for first every time they got there while Myers allowed five Condon men to lather along to first on balls. St. John catches well and has a good strong wing that often comes in handy. Hitesman, Fossil's catcher was put out of business in the seventh by being struck on the left arm while batting and Euerick took his place for the remainder of the game.

A Lone Rock Scrap.

R. M. Johnson came to town Sunday afternoon from Lone Rock to have the head and face patched up which was made necessary by a mix-up he had that day with the Goff family. The engagement is said to have been pulled off in the Lone Rock hotel shortly after church was over and from Mr. Johnson's appearance it must have been a hammer. It would be a hard guess to tell whether Bob's face had been freed by contact with a half mile of five wire, hog tight wire fence or had been summer-made by fists, finger nails and flint rocks but his injuries are not serious.

Johnson swore out a warrant for J. B. Goff's arrest on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon and Mr. Goff was brought to town Monday evening. Before County Judge Dunn Tuesday morning he waived examination and was held to the circuit court in the sum of \$250 bail which was furnished.

The men tell widely different stories about the occurrence Mr. Johnson claiming that he was obliged to scrap Mr. Goff and his two sons at once and that the elder Goff struck him on the head with a rock from behind while he was engaging the two boys in front while Mr. Goff says that the trouble was started while he was at Sunday school by Johnson attacking young Jesse Goff in front of the hotel. Some one ran to the church and told the elder Goff that his son and Johnson were fighting and he ran to the spot but found the fight over and Jesse washing himself in the hotel wash room and that while talking to the boy Johnson came in and attacked him by slugging him in the eye. Goff carries a decorated eye and his face indicates that the summer following was not all done by one side.
