## HOGGING THE RANGE.

A gentleman who is engaged in the stock business in a small way a few miles east of Condon, near Rock creek, complains that a big firm of sheepmen near him who formerly had a big tract of government land enclosed as a pasture for their own special use and benefit, but who recently have allowed their fences to remain open for fear of trouble with the government, now make a practice of herding other people's stock off this particular portion of the public domain in order, presumably, to save the grass for their own stock next winter. The gentleman above referred to thinks this is "hogging" the range with a vengeance and wants to know whether the fact that the big sheepmen have the use of government range all winter necessarily gives them a right to it for the entire year, or whether because he has only a few head of cattle that they should starve or be kept on hay during the summer in order to save the grass on Uncle Sam's range to keep fat his rich neighbor's sheep next winter.

The Globe is not an authority on land law but it looks reasonable that an appeal to the federal authorities would discover the fact that depriving your neighbor's stock of access to the public range by herding is no more permissible than to accomplish the same thing by means of a wire fence. Unlawful "hogging" of the range has been a fruitful source of range wars and general lawlessness in many sections and in the interest of law and order it should be discouraged everywhere.

### THE PEDDLER NUISANCE.

The states of Washington and Idaho are enforcing their laws against peddlers. These states are throwing proper safeguards around the permanent enterprises of their cities and towns by making licenses so high that non-resident, non-taxpaying concerns cannot invade the field to the detriment of home industry. Oregon counties are lacking in this protection. This state is a fertile field for peddlers, grafters and humbugs of all kinds and the license question should be taken up by the county courts and home industries protected. The farmers themselves, who wish to buy as cheaply as possible, suffer even greater injury from the peddlers than do the home dealers. Goods sold at low prices by irresponsible, transient peddlers are sure to be of an inferior grade and after the foreign peddler receives his money and disappears the innocent victims of his frauds have no recourse.
