## Will Soon Run Again.

The Condon Milling Co. plant will again be in active operation in a day or two. The new Monitor electric and scouring machine has arrived from the east and is now in position and as soon as a few minor improvements are completed the mill will be started. The new machine is much larger than the one which it displaces having a capacity for cleaning and scouring 80 bushels of wheat per hour. J. W. Smith, an expert miller from Portland, who comes highly recommended from the Portland Flouring Mills, is here and will take charge of the plant and he believes there is nothing to hinder the mill from turning out a strictly first-class product in the future. W. W. McAnley, a Portland mill-wright, has also been here for some time helping to install the new machine and making other necessary repairs.

## The New Sewer.

Work on the new city sewer is progressing satisfactorily the line having reached the crossing of Main and Spring streets. The new improvement is being constructed of two inch plank 12x12 inches inside and is being laid in the old sewer, or water way and the latter filled in with rock and earth. The improvement is a much needed one and will no doubt improve the sanitary conditions along Main street in a marked degree.

## Teachers Elected.

At a recent meeting of the school board the following teachers were elected for the ensuing year: G. T. McArthur, principal; Peter Nash Jr., Miss Joyce Hirsner, Mrs. G. A. Berry, assistants. In that particular branch of work she is said to be something of a specialist. We hope to see the school have a most successful year under the present regime.

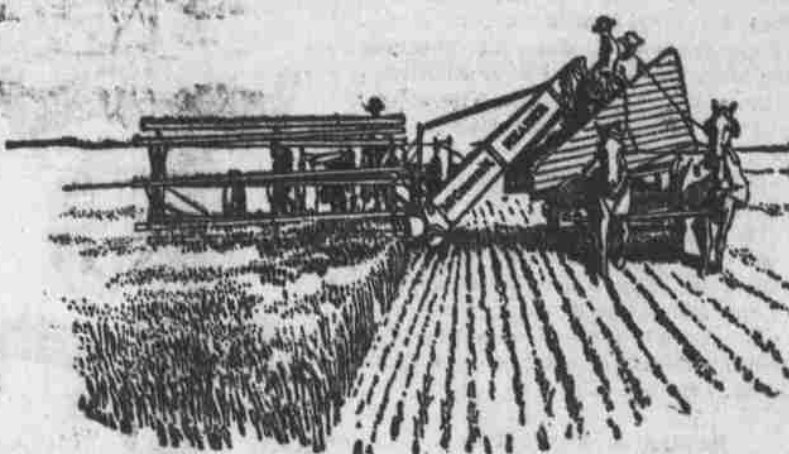
