GILLIAM AT THE FAIR.

The meeting which is called for Saturday evening to arrange for the collection of a suitable exhibit from this county for the Lewis and Clark Fair is of great importance and merits the attention of every progressive citizen. That the county should make a creditable showing at this exposition, which promises to be of more than national importance, none will deny and that the best results can only be accomplished by proper organization and hearty cooperation on the part of all the citizens, all will admit. The object of this meeting is to perfect such an organization and to enlist the cooperation of every citizen and in this it should be made a success.
