Her genial, sunny disposition, her bright intellect and her true womanliness won for her a host of devoted friends who will most sincerely mourn her untimely demise. Her husband and three young children, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. Fitzmaurice, now residents of Moro, her sisters and brothers, will have the warmest sympathy of many friends in the hour of their bitter sorrow over the untimely passing of her young life. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon being in the Catholic cemetery near Mayville.

Oregon Development League.

Having for its object the development of grand old Oregon, the elimination of those and the destruction of barnacles, the Oregon Development League will be organized at Portland August 21st, by a convention of representative citizens from every part of a state which has been called for that purpose. The majority of each county and the mayor of every city and town in the state is expected to name ten wise awake citizens who will attend the convention as delegates. The railroads have made a rate of one fare for the round trip from all points in the state for the convention. Tillamook county and Clatsop should be represented at this convention and the proper officials should appoint delegates. Killed Big Lynx.

Rube McKinney killed a monster lynx down on Thurston's Sunday with his six shooter. He was looking after his cattle, which range along the creek and while riding slowly along came suddenly upon the varmint at a distance of about 50 yards. Rube pulled his gun and took a swift shot at the beast and succeeded in wounding him which had the effect of putting the lynx on the flight instanter. The creature at once turned and made for his assistant with blood in his eye and Rube took two more shots which went wild. This left him but one more cartridge and he concluded he would better make that one count or he might be in for it, waiting until Mr. Lenz got within a few feet of him, he took a good aim and made a dead shot. The lynx is one of the largest specimens of his kind and attracted much attention in town Monday. The species is getting to be very scarce here rarely being seen except well back in the mountains. They are distinguished from the more common wildcat by their tasseled ears and short, ringed tail.

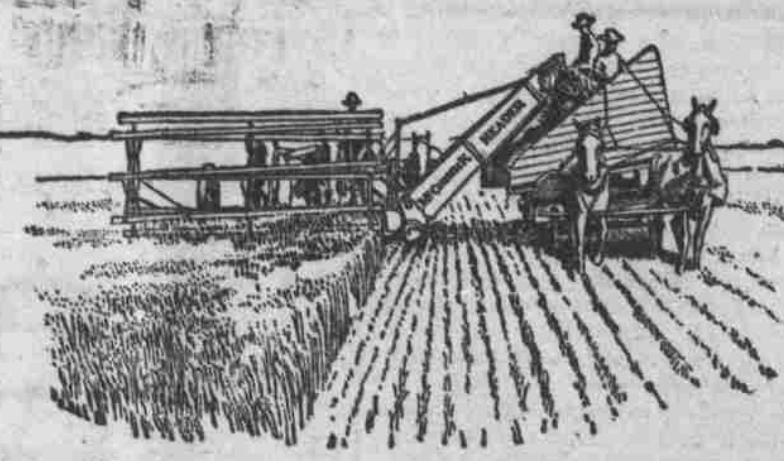
