War has broken out in Condon. The first gun was fired Tuesday noon and there were several fatalities. An orchard, a squad of industrial chickens, a 22 caliber, a team and a woman were in the fence and the loss of life has so far been confined to the chickens. It is rather hard to tell where the trouble will end.

Body Disinterred.

Unbearable excitement was caused in Arlington last Saturday when it became known that the grave of Fred Dow, who had been opened at an early hour that morning, the body disinterred and the viscera removed and taken to Portland for analysis. The work was done by Sheriff Van Vactor and District Attorney Ward, of Klamath county, Washington, under authority said to have been given them by Justice of the Peace Collins, of Arlington, who was present when the body was exhumed.

Down was a well known shopkeeper of Klamath county and died on the 12th day of last April. He left an estate valued at from \$30,000 to \$40,000 and it is said to be largely composed of mortgages. He carried life insurance policies to the amount of \$7000, \$5000 being in the Pacific Mutual and \$2000 in the Western. Since his death there has been more or less talk in the neighborhood of his home, as well as at Arlington, that the death was caused by strychnine poisoning and it was for the purpose of clearing up the case, and to a legal mystery that the body was disinterred.

Many reports touching the case have reached this place and some of the are calculated to lead to the belief that the whole matter may be a case of a matter of fact which is said to be between Arlington and Klamath counties. It is reported here that the doctor who treated Mr. Dow in the months prior to his death refused for several months to furnish a death certificate to the insurance companies on the ground that he believed death was caused by strychnine poisoning and it is also reported that a rival physician, who is also proprietor of a drug store, refused to have on the prescription written by doctor S. T. for Mr. Dow shortly prior to his death, unless he could give a prescription of strychnine. It is probable that the doctor who treated Mr. Dow is now in court for settlement. The case has now become more or less involved in the gossip talk which the case has given rise and while, so far as the facts are concerned, no direct charges have been made against Mr. Dow's doctor, it has caused a great deal of worry and suffering from nervous prostration.

The general feeling here is that a Klamath physician acted unethically in a warrant in distributing a grave in a cemetery without first securing proper authority and that in so doing they have violated the law and that the bodies buried in the graves of the deceased are in jeopardy. They will be vigorously presented, before making in a statement Mr. Snover can be depended on to see that the bodies are returned to the Washington office to be examined by the body.

The affair promises to be a very important one for it is being watched.

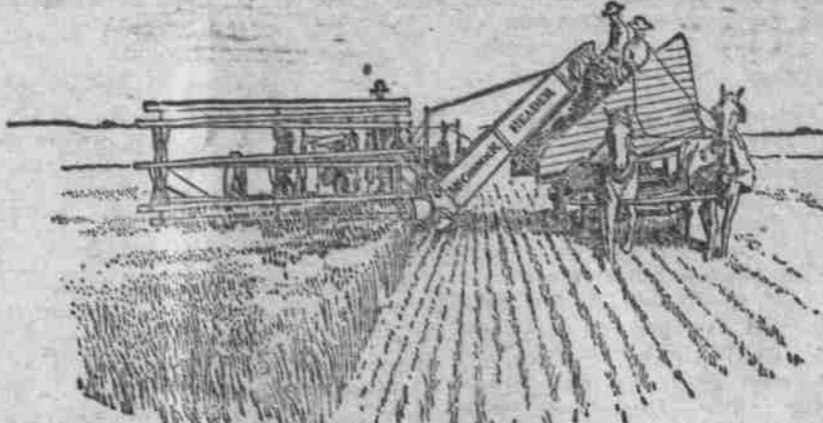
