For the Portage.

W. J. Mariner and J. A. Smith, of Blalock, and Dr. N. G. Blalock, of Walla Walla, were in Portland last week in the interest of the portage road. From Portland they went to Salem to confer with the state portage board in regard to the work. To the state board the gentlemen above named made a proposition to organize a private company properly financed, to build the road, the company to put up a sufficient bond to guarantee the fulfillment of its contracts. The company will also undertake to raise such amount as may be necessary in addition to the original appropriation to build and equip the road and also to complete the work in time to move next seasons crop. When the work is completed it is to be turned over to the state. It seems to be up to the portage board to do business or get out of the way of people who are ready to do. Messrs Mariner and Blalock are taking an active interest in this matter and the people of Eastern Oregon earnestly hope to see their efforts successful.

Good Wheat.

Thrashing is now in full blast in all sections of the county and reports from the field indicate that in most localities the crop is a record breaker. In the north end of the county the yield is no greater than a year ago but the quality is strictly A No. 3, while in the central and southern portions the yield is probably the best ever harvested and the quality is also first-class. Dunn Bros. have just finished thrashing their crop near town which yielded better than 30 bushels per acre and reports from other localities indicate that in some fields the 40 bushel mark is being beaten. The crop of Dunn Bros., above referred to, was harvested from land which they bought about a year ago at what was then considered a big price but the present crop will almost if not altogether pay for the land. That's what Gilliam county soil will do.
