PORTLAND AND THE PORTAGE.

Speaking of the Portage road project, the Portland Journal gets close to the nail head in this fashion:

"The project has already passed the stage of resounding in its behalf; results are demanded and nothing short of them will satisfy. Here is the supreme test of whether Portland will use its vast influence and power in aiding a work that eastern Oregon demands or whether it will let that part of the state fight on the battle alone. There should be no question of what, under such circumstances Portland will do."

This implies that in the past Portland has "resolved" on the Portage more than it has worked for the Portage and eastern Oregon people are prepared to believe this to be correct. It is time for Portland to fling the mane of man from its eyes and get wise to the importance of this project to itself. The Portage means almost everything to the development of the Inland Empire but it also means much to the city that gets our trade.
