Another Bank.

Condon is to have another bank.

The announcement was made Monday evening by F. T. Hurlburt, who is one of the incorporators and who will doubtless be cashier of the new institution when it opens its doors for business. To a representative of this paper Mr. Hurlburt stated that the articles of incorporation are being prepared by J. W. Suover, of this city, the incorporators being F. T. Hurlburt, E. O. McCoy, W. Lord and W. J. Barnes. Mr. Barnes is the head of the Portland house of Balfour, Guthrie & Co., one of the largest and richest corporations doing business on the coast. Mr. McCoy is a well known capitalist of The Dalles and Wasco, being largely interested in the Oregon Trading Co. at the last named place. The other two incorporators are well known to most of our readers. The capital stock of the new bank will be \$50,000 divided in 500 shares of \$100 each.

While in town Monday Mr. Hurlburt closed a deal with W. L. Barker for the corner lot immediately south of Merrifield's studio, on Main street, where the home of the new institution will be erected. While the plans for the building have not yet been worked out in detail, Mr. Hurlburt authorized the general statement that the building will be about 25x65, two stories high, the first floor to be fitted up in the most modern fashion for a banking house the second story to be fitted up for office purposes. The building will be of brick with sanitary plumbing throughout.

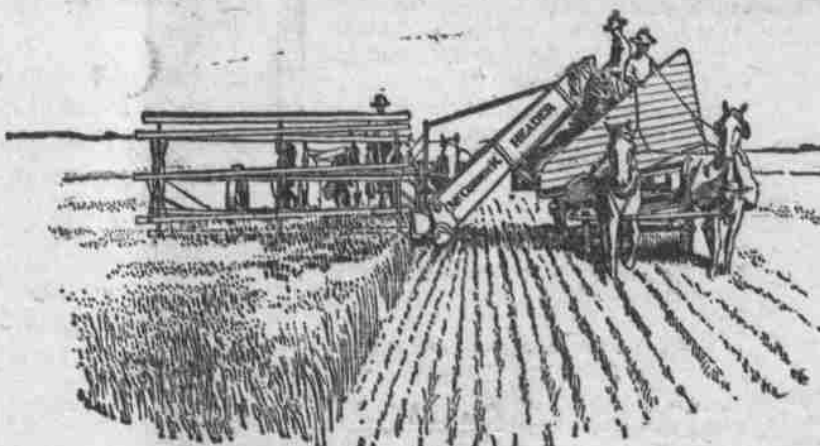
