NEED OF BETTER FIRE PROTECTION.

The disastrous fire of last Tuesday morning was a costly pointer to the people of this city on the urgent need of a more adequate water supply and a better system of protection against fire. With everything dry as tinder, only the most favorable conditions as regards the force and direction of the wind saved the town from a general conflagration, the property loss of which might as readily have run into the hundreds of thousands as to have been confined to \$5000 or \$6000. Had a stiff breeze been blowing directly from the east last Tuesday morning it is more than probable that the fire would have been driven to Main street and once there the greatest part of the city would have been doomed.

The present water system has been, and still is so far as purity and efficient service goes, a matter of pride to our people but, the fact is, the town has outgrown it and it is now up to the people to either enlarge and modernize it to such an extent as will amply meet the requirements of a progressive city or else take continual chances on having their homes and property swept away by fire. Aside from this it is plainly evident that within a year the present system will be inadequate to supply the city with water for domestic use and irrigation purposes to say nothing of fire protection. Condon is growing and will continue to grow and the people must keep up with the town.

It is said that an ample supply of pure spring water can be secured within four miles of town and that this property can be acquired, reservoirs constructed and a plant installed for \$25,000 or \$30,000—4 or 5 times the amount of Tuesday's fire. Can the town afford not to do this? It is certainly worthy of consideration.

Proposed Herd Law.

Petitions are being prepared for circulation throughout the county, asking the Oregon legislature, at its next session to enact a herd law for this county similar to the one now in force in Sherman and Morrow counties. Representative farmers in all sections of the county and other interested parties, are behind the movement and they argue that such a law is necessary here at this time for the reason that such laws being now operative in adjoining counties makes it necessary for this county to enact a similar law for self protection, otherwise all loose stock found running at large in the counties either east or west of us are apt to be run over the line into this county. They argue further that the public range in this county has been so reduced that it can no longer be regarded as a stock country and for this reason if for no other, such legislation should be secured as would best conserve the interests of the wheat growers whose product represents a greater money value than all the stock products of the county combined. The requirements for a legal fence under the present law, these people say, are so palpably absurd and impossible of fulfillment that no sane man would attempt to comply with them and that if the wheat fields are to be protected a herd law is an urgent necessity.

These arguments appear to have considerable force and as the subject is one of more or less interest to every resident of the county the GLOBE will be glad to devote a reasonable amount of space to anyone who cares to give his views on the matter to the public.
