Still school, of Kirksville Mo., and he is recognized as one of the most successful practitioners of this method of healing in the Pacific northwest. The trial of Horace Butcher and Evan Stevens, charged with the larceny of a steer came up for trial Tuesday afternoon in the circuit court. The case proceeded without interruption until Wednesday afternoon and argument by counsel had been commenced when Mr. Butcher, one of the defendants, was taken violently ill and had to be removed to a hotel and a physician summoned. Court was dismissed until 8 o'clock this morning when Mr. Butcher was carried in on a stretcher and, further argument being waived, the case was given to the jury. A Costly Blaze.

A disastrous fire visited Condon at an early hour Tuesday morning entailing a property loss of \$4000.

The fire originated in the kitchen of the Summit hotel, of which D. M. Rinehart is the proprietor, from an unknown cause. Shortly before 3 o'clock the blaze was discovered and so rapidly did the flames spread, in less than an hour's time the big hotel building, W. A. Darling's residence and a barn belonging to Philip Morrell on a lot adjoining the hotel, were reduced to smoldering heaps of ashes.

Miss Grahame, a boarder at the hotel, was the first person to discover that something was wrong. Her room was in the north side of the building directly over the kitchen. She was aroused by the smell of smoke and, arising and quickly dressing herself, she awoke the occupant of the next room who in turn rushed into the hallway and gave the alarm. This aroused Mr. Rinehart and, without waiting to learn the exact location of the fire, but in the belief that it was in some other building, he at once, as a precautionary measure, started to awake the sleeping inmates, giving the alarm of fire at the door of every room. After making the round he discovered that it was his own building which was on fire. He at once started on another round, this time breaking in the door of every room and making sure that every guest and employee was awakened. This prompt action no doubt saved several lives as the flames spread with such rapidity that it is hardly possible that all would have awoke in time to have saved themselves. As it was many of the transient guests saved only a portion of their clothing while the regular roomers lost practically all of their clothing and personal effects. One gentleman left all his clothing except his under garments in the room but, upon reaching the lower hallway, he spied his linen duster on the rack and slipping into that breezy but comfortably capacious garment he was thankful.

It soon became evident that W. A. Darling's residence was doomed and the furniture and other effects were mostly removed and saved. A futile effort was made to save the house by wetting down the roof but the heat soon became so intense as to drive the workers far back. The effort to save Mr. Darling's paper store was more successful. By hard work it was saved although the stock had been removed in the belief that the building would surely go.

It was a close call for the business section of the city. Had the light wind which came from the northeast shifted to the east or increased materially in velocity it is doubtful if anything could have saved Main street. Showers of blazing shingles were scattered all over the southwest section of the city and it seemed almost miraculous that numerous fires were not started in that quarter.

While the water supply held out fairly well and was of considerable service in protecting other buildings, the fact was clearly demonstrated that our present water system is entirely inadequate for such an emergency as occurred Tuesday morning. It was also shown that the city is in need of a well drilled hose team. When the hose cart first reached the scene a connection was made with the hydrant at the hotel corner within ten feet of the burning building and it was only a short time until the intense heat burned off the hose and allowed the water to run to waste. A line of hose was then laid from Main street but the waste so reduced the pressure that the stream at the command of the nozzle-men was inefficient. Then three young men, Ira Luna, Will Barnes and Frank Goodwin, determined on an attempt to close the open plug. Luna covered himself with a wet blanket and made a rush for the plug followed by the others carrying buckets of water with which to drench him when the blanket began smoking. It was a hot job but the boys were game and the trick was soon turned. Luna was almost parboiled under his blanket and Barnes and Goodwin were nearly roasted but their nerve saved the highly prized water supply.
