M. D. L. Rhodes was here Friday adjusting the losses sustained in Tuesday morning's fire. All three of the buildings destroyed were insured in the same company the settlement made by Mr. Rhodes being quite satisfactory to the owners of the property destroyed.

Mrs. Wood returned Sunday from a protracted visit at Portland. She brought back with her the infant son of her deceased sister who died a few weeks ago. Her brother-in-law accompanied her to Condon but returned to Portland Monday.

Horace Walker, one of the commissioners of Umatilla county, was here during the week on business connected with his investments in Gilliam county. He recently purchased a fine wheat farm from George Moore of Ferry Canyon.

G. W. Marvel, the well known Rock creek orchardist, was in town during the week selling fruit. Mr. Marvel grows a very fine variety of prunes which he propagated at his place from a seedling tree. It is similar to the Italian variety but is finer flavored and the pit is entirely free.

A grading camp is being established this week near the Lynch farm, eight or nine miles north of town and active operations will be under way on that section of the line within a few days. It is expected that another camp will be established near town in a short time and grading commenced from this end of the line. This will effectually settle the much mooted question of where the depot and terminal will be located as all sorts of stories are still rife as to that matter in spite of the fact that the surveys and blue prints made by the company's engineers show their exact location.

W. Lord and F. T. Harburt were here during the week looking after matters connected with the deeding of lands donated by themselves and J. E. Lancaster to the railroad company for depot and yard grounds and warehouse purposes. These gentlemen are giving the company something like 30 acres of valuable lands and the arrangements are all made for signing the papers transferring this property to the company. This is the only concession made by anyone in Condon to the railroad people and in return all they ask of the city is that the council grant a franchise to the railroad people for trackage privilege on Ward and East streets for a block or two south from the north boundary of the incorporation. This trackage will be needed as the town grows, these gentlemen say, to accommodate wholesale houses and dealers in heavy merchandise and they feel that the franchise is not much to ask from the city. "At all events," Mr. Harburt stated while here "the deeds for our concessions will not be executed until the city council has granted this franchise." "We believe, however," he continued, "that the council will do the right thing in this matter and grant the desired concession without question."
