Farmers' Institutes.

A series of Farmers' Institutes will be held next month in this county which will be of especial interest to all of our people from the fact that the subjects discussed will bear directly on our principal industry, farming. Several speakers will be present to address the meetings, among them being three professors from the State Agricultural College, at Corvallis, all of whom are well qualified to discuss matters of interest to farmers from a scientific standpoint. The dates of these meetings are as follows:

Alvillo, Tuesday, October 18th.
Condon, Wednesday and Thursday, October 19th, and 20th.

Mayville, Friday and Saturday, October 21st and 22nd.

Three sessions will be held each day at 10 a. m., 2:00 p. m., and 7:30 p. m.

The committee in charge of arrangements at Alvillo make the request that all persons attending the institute at that place bring a lunch basket so they may be able to enjoy a basket dinner and remain all day and for the evening session as well.

It is expected that a program will be arranged by which some of our best local musical talent will enliven the several sessions of the institute at this place.

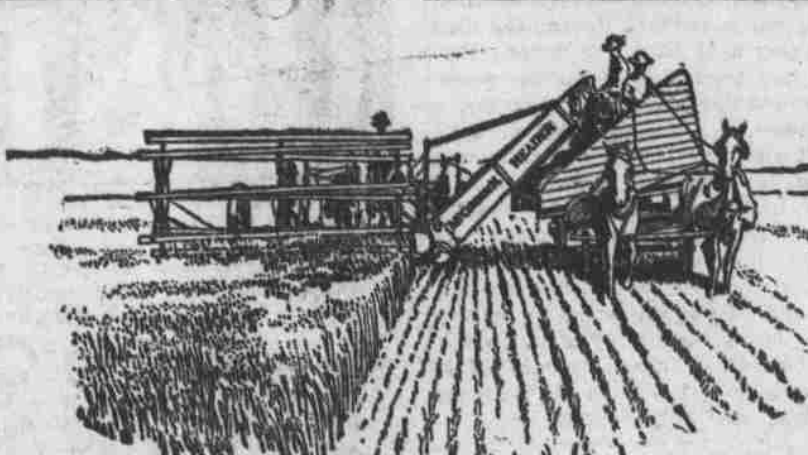
