INDEPENDENT MEN NEEDED.

A trick occasionally resorted to by politicians whose business is to work the public is being played in Chicago, particularly in respect of candidates for the legislature. As it makes no difference what the political complexion, in a number of the legislative districts of that city one of the principal political parties has nominated no candidate.  2. That the use of public office for private gain is treason.
 3. That a free state is entitled to the unselfish fidelity of every free man and that the war for civic honesty demands the enlistment of all patriots."
- If he means this, and can be depended on to carry out these principles, he ought to be elected. Every state needs such men in its legislature. Every city needs them in its council.

There has been and is entirely too much partisanship for the public health. Party worship is a political disease. What the people need is men in public life who will do the people's necessary business capably, promptly and with inflexible honesty, regardless of party pressure or the selfish ambitions of professional politicians.—Oregon Journal.

Samuel P. Garrott, of Cottage Grove, Oregon, one of the oldest Odd Fellows in the state, died recently in California. He was made an Odd Fellow in Ohio in 1852 and remained in good standing in the order for more than 52 years. The writer was present in the Oregon Grand Lodge at Newport two years ago when Father Garrott was present and when that body voted him the veteran's jewel, which is only bestowed on members of 30 years standing.
