How Condon Grows.

Condon is growing livelier every day. The demand for city property is increasing and every stage comes in loaded down with people seeking business locations in what is surely destined to become the most important business center in this section of eastern Oregon.

As an indication of what is doing the following list of real estate deals made within the last few days is given together with the purpose for which the lots have been acquired, so far as obtainable at this time:

Condon Warehouse Co., two lots north of Arlington Lumber Co's. yard. They have already commenced work on a corrugated iron building 50x100 feet to cost about \$3000. They will engage in a general warehouse business and also in the manufacture of feed and breakfast food products.

A. J. Chabot, recently from Minnesota, has purchased two desirable corner lots on Main street and will erect a large brick business block next summer. Mr. Chabot is seeking a profitable investment for his money in acquiring Condon business property.

R. B. Galbreath, also from The Dalles, has purchased two business lots and also two residence lots. He will build on the latter at once and later will improve his business property but has not yet announced what line of business he will engage in.

The Arlington Lumber Co. has purchased all of Block 51, east of their present yard, and will probably occupy the same next Summer.

A. S. Hollen has purchased an acre tract in Lancaster's addition and will erect a number of cottages thereon for rent. Other parties who have bought acreage in the same addition are: U. E. Bushnell, H. L. Johnson and D. B. Thomas.

In the residence district on the east side of town J. W. Merrifield, Abe Meyer and Phillip Morrell have purchased lots we understand will improve the same in the near future.

The above sales amount to something like \$5000 but they mean several times that amount in permanent improvements within the next few months.
