You said you would like to hear from me in regard to the Peterson Land Roller you let me have this spring to try on my field north of Wasco. I used the roller on 50 acres that I finished sowing on the 10th day of May. On the 50 acres that I rolled I got double the stand and double the amount of wheat that I did from the land which I did not roll. On the land which I did not roll the wheat was a poor stand and did not stand so well as the other, fell over and tangled up so that it was hard to save with the header. The 50 acres that was rolled was a good stand and all stood up in fine shape to cut, and the ground was in excellent condition for the header, it was packed solid which made it very easy for my teams. I consider it the lightest draft and one of the best farm tools I ever used. It is a land roller in every sense of the word; it packs the ground below the surface, while other surface rollers only pack it on top. Farmers' Institute.

Judging from the attendance at the farmers' institute advertised for this place yesterday, the farmers of this precinct are either too busy to attend such meetings or else they feel that they do not need instruction in scientific farming. The morning session was postponed for want of an audience and the afternoon meeting was very slimly attended. At the evening session an interesting lecture, illustrated with stereoscopic views, was enjoyed by a fair sized audience. The speakers present were: Dr. James Withycombe, director of the experiment station at the Oregon Agricultural College, Prof. F. L. Kent, in charge of the dairying industry and Prof. A. B. Cordley, entomologist of the same institution. All these gentlemen are experts in their line, which is practical farming conducted on a scientific basis and it is a matter of regret that the farmers of this section did not manifest more interest in the meetings.

They go from here to Mayville where the people promise them big audiences. The meeting held at Alvite Tuesday was well attended, the grange hall being packed to its fullest capacity.

Ed Palmer, the successful well driller, brought in a fine well on C. L. Lillie's place in Mayville precinct, last Wednesday at a depth of 210 feet. The supply of water is said to be inexhaustible, all efforts of the workmen to pump it out in order to test the supply proving fruitless. Such a well will prove of great value to Mr. Lillie's fine ranch.
