Dr. Roy E. Smith arrived from Portland yesterday and will be found in his office in the Globe building as announced last week. He was detained by business matters from getting here sooner.

S. J. Kuster left Monday morning for the St. Louis fair and a visit to his former home at Carleton, Michigan. He ordered the Globe sent to his address at that place in order to keep in touch with Condon happenings.

S. O. Pool, of the Church of Christ, now located at Seattle, Washington, will be here Saturday to commence a series of revival meetings. Mr. Pool has visited Condon before and is recognized as one of the best pulpit orators who has ever addressed a Condon audience.

An important real estate deal was closed Saturday when George Hanson, of near Allville, sold 240 acres of fine land to A. H. Kerby, of Adams. Umatilla county, the price being \$20 per acre. The ranch is one of the finest in the county and Mr. Kerby is more than pleased with his investment. He left for Adams Monday but will soon return accompanied by his father and mother to take up their residence on the place.

Dr. McLain, state veterinary surgeon, was here during the week looking into the alleged case of cattle mange which was reported by a government inspector some weeks ago as existing in a band of cattle belonging to Mr. Reynolds. Dr. McLain examined every animal in the band that showed the least sign of being infected with the parasite but found nothing to indicate the presence of the disease. He took samples of skin from several of the animals, however, and will have a careful microscopic tests made. The doctor was highly pleased with the appearance of this section of Gilliam county and spoke highly of the superior grade of horses, cattle and other stock which he saw on the trip.

Ben Steever, a well known character around Arlington for several years past, died at that place Monday afternoon after a lingering illness. Ben was only a gambler but those who knew him well recognized the fact that beneath his rough exterior throbbed as big, warm a heart as ever treated a man "square" or a dumb brute kindly. His pet dog, and inseparable companion Calvus, is as well known as was his master and while he lives Ben will not be forgotten. Ben's life may have been wasted, his opportunities for being a useful citizen thrown away, but it is worth something to be able to say of a man after he is gone that he treated people square and that his dog loved him.

Condon Commercial Club.

In the circuit court room last evening the Condon Commercial Club was organized with Mayor Reischer chairman and C. O. Portwood secretary. Jay Bowerman, J. W. Snover and S. A. Patton were appointed to draft a constitution and by-laws to report at the next meeting. Judge Dunn, S. B. Barker and John Jackson were appointed to look up the matter of a more adequate water supply for the city, to report at the next meeting. The chairman was instructed to name a committee of seven to recommend needed changes in the city charter. The names of this committee will be announced later. It was an all-pull-together meeting and promises well for the future. The club will meet again next Wednesday evening.

Council Proceedings.

At a special meeting of the city council held Monday evening J. F. Reischer was chosen to act as mayor to fill the unexpired term of W. L. Wilcox who removed from the city and resigned. The ordinance granting a franchise to the railroad company for right of way over Ward and East streets passed second reading and was finally passed Tuesday evening. The new council room, adjoining the fire hall is completed and was occupied for the first time Monday evening. An ordinance was passed first reading forbidding live stock to run at large within the city limits.

An aftermath of the closing of gambling a short time ago, came up Monday when an information was filed with the city recorder charging Wilson & Abbey, proprietors of the Belvedere saloon with conducting a gambling house. B. K. Searey, another saloon man, proprietor of the Buckhorn saloon was the complaining witness. The case is set for trial next Saturday at 2 o'clock.

This was his first visit to Gilliam and Wheeler counties and to a representative of this paper he expressed himself as being agreeably surprised with the fine farming country and lively towns. He expected to find such a country as lies west of The Dalles, in Wasco county, but found a vast difference in the two sections in Gilliam's favor.
