WILL BENEFIT CONDON.

The Condon Commercial Club organized last week should prove of great benefit to the town and county and will, if the citizens of Condon and vicinity will unite, in giving the organization the support and encouragement it merits. No section of country can attain its highest state of development without some organization on the part of its citizens and thoughtful men in this city and county begin to realize that the time has arrived for united effort in bringing grand old Gilliam county out of the shadows of the old regime and into the prominent position which her rich and varied resources entitle her to occupy in the newer and greater Oregon.

When the call was issued for the first meeting to perfect an organization there were doubtless many citizens who thought, if they did not say, that it was no use to attempt such an organization at this time. Similar efforts had been made in the past only to come to naught. The town is going ahead all right as it is and we might as well let well enough alone. Even the warmest friends of the project may have had misgivings but if they had they didn't say so and the lively manner in which the club was organized and the active interest shown in every question of public concern which was brought up at that time quickly dispelled all fears that the people of Condon were not ready to take their places alongside the progressive citizens of other up-to-date towns of the state in an earnest effort to advance the material interests of the state, county and city.

Two matters of great importance to Condon were broached at the first meeting and, forthwith, committees of prominent citizens were appointed to investigate and make reports to future meetings of the club. We refer to the water question and to the matter of necessary changes in the city charter. Every body has realized for months that the town must have a better water supply and that in order to keep up with the rapid growth of the city certain changes in the charter are absolutely necessary. But no one was in a position to successfully take the initiative in these matters and so they were allowed to drag along until the Commercial Club was organized. Even before the club was permanently established these matters were taken up, and in such a decisive, business-like way that it was at once patent that the people wanted action at the earliest opportunity. All that was needed was an organization. That has now been supplied and it devolves on every citizen to give it his material and moral support in all things it may undertake looking to the betterment of Condon and Gilliam county. Let every one stay by the commercial club. Let's push ahead and pull ahead with a big boost altogether for the advancement of Condon. United we can just as easily have a strictly first-class, up-to-date city as to pull at variance and have a country cross-road village and the cost will be no greater for the former than for the latter. Condon has never had a boom and many citizens say they don't want to see one and while this club is not a boom organization its members seem to have decided to go in for a good town even at the risk of getting a boom. "What's the diff," say they. "We'll take a long chance on the boom and if it comes in spite of us and makes a city out of a small town and brings trade and advances the price of property and cleans up the streets and fixes the sidewalks and puts in a gravity water system and builds a sewer and does a lot of other things that we want done we will take our medicine." Stay with the club.

Prohibition Not Local Option.

Prohibition, not local option, is the question which is to be decided at the coming election. Many people do not seem to grasp the distinction. The local option question was settled last June when the local option law was adopted by popular vote. It is no longer an issue. The question which now confronts the voters is straight-out prohibition.

In more than a score of counties of Oregon the people will vote on November 8 upon the question whether the county in which they live shall in future be "dry." An affirmative majority in any county means the absolute prohibition of all traffic in liquor anywhere within the county.

The passage of the local option law was accomplished mainly on the plea that it was designed to prevent saloons from invading residential districts. Those who voted for the law because they did not wish to have saloons near their homes, but not because they believed in absolute prohibition of the saloons. A large proportion of the men engaged in the liquor business are themselves in favor of excluding the saloons from the residential districts, and they opposed the local option law only because it was really a prohibition law in disguise.

This opposition appears to have been justified by the results. The law had scarcely gone into effect when proceedings were commenced by the prohibitionists in more than two-thirds of the counties of the state to absolutely destroy the liquor business in those counties. They did not content themselves with prohibiting saloons in residential districts, but they demanded prohibition for entire counties.

Moderate men, who believe in true local option, but not in county prohibition, have entered strong protest, and in Multnomah county many of the church people have charged the radical prohibitionists with bad faith in forcing the issue of county prohibition. Not one voter in a thousand need to vote for prohibition in order to protect his home from the encroachment of the saloon. If he does vote for prohibition he strikes a needless blow at thousands of his fellow citizens.

Will it Pay?

The matter of voting for or against prohibition next Tuesday should be considered from a strictly dispassionate standpoint. If the county should go for prohibition it will prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors. At this time, with a railroad building through the county and the country full of transient people this writer believes that it will not. Such, at least, has been the history of prohibition under similar conditions in the past. The only certain effect it will have will be to cut off all the revenue which now comes from the liquor business. Condon alone will lose \$3000 a year in license. Can the city afford it? Are the people willing to tax themselves to make up the deficit? We understand that several alleged drug stores and some so-called soft drink establishments will be opened here if prohibition carries. They will pay no license. Will it pay the town or county to make this change? Will it help the temperance cause. From a dispassionate standpoint it doesn't look as though it will.
