Injured in Runaway.

A rather serious accident occurred last Thursday evening about two miles north of town. Misses Carrie Danneman and Bessie Redford were on their way from the former's home at Clem to attend the Caledonian concert when the horse they were driving became frightened as they were passing the railroad camp near the Campbell place and ran away. Both young ladies were thrown to the ground and seriously injured. Mr. Hastings, contractor on that section of the road, was the first to reach them and at once brought them to town. They were taken to Dr. Wood's home where every attention was given them. Miss Danneman's injuries were found to be the most serious and it was feared her condition might become alarming at any time. She has been steadily improving, however, and at this writing is about fully recovered. Miss Redford's injuries were but slight, aside from the shock, and she was able to return home Sunday.

Caledonian Meeting.

The Caledonian meeting is now a thing of the past and it will be remembered as the most successful affair of its kind ever celebrated in this city. From far and near the clansmen gathered and by Thursday noon the hotels and streets were crowded with guests all intent on making the most of a gala time that comes to this section of Eastern Oregon but once a year, and to Condon but once in three years. The Portland delegation arrived Thursday afternoon and were accorded a cordial welcome by the local clansmen who had gathered to receive them.

At eight o'clock Thursday evening Armory hall was crowded to its utmost capacity by an enthusiastic audience gathered to enjoy the Scotch concert. Chief Chieftain Wm. Riddle, of near Fossil presided and introduced the various performers in a most happy manner. James Moon, the veteran piper, formerly with the Black Watch, 42nd Highland Regiment, was on hand with his pipes and was ably assisted by Rob Roy Burt, a young piper of marked ability. Judge George Cameron, of Portland delivered the annual address and the remainder of the program was made up of Scotch songs and dances of the highest order of merit. Miss Rosie Forbes, perhaps the most accomplished dancer in her class in the north west, delighted the audience with her every appearance on the stage as did Miss Myrie Sharp who is also a general favorite in this part of the state. Frank D'Arcy and Willie McCormack, pupils of Miss Forbes also showed much ability in their execution of difficult Highland dances. Mrs. W. D. Deavers and Miss Laurie Stanton, of Portland, both accomplished vocalists, delighted the audience with many of the oldest and sweetest songs of Bonnie Scotland, and Mrs. J. F. Reinacher, of this city also favored the gathering with a fine selection.

Friday evening the same performers rendered a different program to a large audience and it was the unanimous verdict that the second concert was the better. A 24 hour trip by train and stage through dust and wind is not conducive to bringing out the best there is in voice or feet and it is no disparagement to these performers to say that the effects of the trip was noticeable the first evening. On the second evening, however, the singers were in perfect form and the writer has seldom been present at a similar occasion when such perfect sympathy seemed to exist between the entertainers and the entertained.

A business meeting was held Friday forenoon when the following officers were elected for the coming year: Wm. Riddle, chief clansman; John Dymart, 1st chieftain; J. D. McFarland 2nd chieftain and secretary; James Stewart, treasurer; James Moon, piper. These meetings are expensive affairs to the club but the liberal patronage always accorded them makes it possible to pull out even, this being done at the recent meeting by the members all paying their yearly dues to help swell the receipts. In all respects the occasion may be recorded as a great success.

Townsite Changes Hands.

An important deal was closed last Friday when W. Lord, of The Dalles, became owner of a one-half interest in the Condon townsite formerly owned by J. E. Lancaster. The deal also included Mr. Lancaster's interest in the Taylor tract which adjoins the townsite on the north and west which was purchased by Messrs. Lord, Harburt and Lancaster some two years ago. The deal aggregates something over \$12,000 and beside this Mr. Lancaster reserves several fine lots on Main street and a half block of desirable residence property on East street. Mr. Lord is one of the shrewdest business men in the state and this deal shows the faith he has in the future of Condon and the high esteem in which he holds real estate in this city. Mr. Lancaster says he did not sell because of any lack of faith in the town but that he simply had a chance to realize very handsomely on his investment and took advantage of it. He does not expect to leave Condon unless perhaps for a short vacation but will remain here in what he believes will be the best town in Eastern Oregon.
