Commercial Club.

At the regular meeting of the Condon Commercial Club held Wednesday evening of last week matters of importance to the town were taken up. A resolution was adopted favoring the early establishment of the county high school at this place and a committee was appointed to confer with the county court relative to the matter. Judge Dunn made a statement regarding the matter from the county court's standpoint and expressed himself as being heartily in favor of the project. Another resolution was introduced by Mr. Bowerman asking that a committee be appointed to gather evidence relative to the alleged unjust official acts of the federal stock inspector who has jurisdiction over this county the charge having been made that he has refused shipment from the county to cattle which time and a careful inspection by the state veterinarian showed were not diseased in any way. It is claimed that the official's action has worked a hardship not only on the owner of the stock but that it has given a black eye to the stock industry of the entire county. A committee, consisting of H. W. Cooke, Geo. B. Drake, J. M. Cameron, F. M. Platter and C. F. Armstrong, was appointed to make a careful investigation of the matter and it is the wish of the committee that anyone in possession of facts touching the case will communicate with some one of the committee at their earliest convenience. The water committee asked for more time in which to report. A committee on membership was appointed to canvass the town and community for new members.

R. W. Crane, of Bockhorn, was in town Thursday. Mr. Crane has just completed a water system for his fine ranch home which is perhaps one of the most complete of its kind in the county. The plant consists of a 250 foot drilled well equipped with a wind engine and large storage tank which supplies his house, barn and garden with a bountiful supply of fine water. The house is plumbed throughout with hot and cold water in every room and several hydrants are placed at convenient points around the lawn and garden for irrigation purposes. The plant complete cost about \$2000. W. B. Penticost, of Mayville, was in town during the week settling up the estate of H. W. Penticost, deceased, of which he is guardian for the minor heirs. J. W. Snover was his legal adviser in the matter. Henry and Hugh Strickland are preparing to erect a building on their lot recently purchased on North Main street. It is understood they will occupy it as a meat market. There will be preaching services at the Congregational church next Sunday morning at 11 o'clock. All invited.
