The Globe Grows.

During the past week the publisher of this paper has purchased a new and up-to-date printing outfit in Portland which will be installed at once and on which the paper will in the future be printed. This expenditure was made necessary by the rapidly increasing business of the office in advertising, subscriptions and job printing, which is occasioned by the rapid growth of the town. The new outfit consists of a large Gordon press, a Chandler & Price paper cutter, a two-horse gasoline engine and a large amount of other printing material which will be required to promptly handle our increasing business. The size of the paper will be increased from four to eight pages, but the price will remain as before. This change has meant a large expenditure of money to the publisher and will mean an increased expense every week in the future but it will enable us to handle our advertising business properly, leaving plenty of room for a full news service which will embrace the general, State, County and local news. We believe the change will be appreciated by the tilliam county public and that this appreciation will be shown by an even more rapid growth of our business than we have been favored with during the past few months. The past four years have demonstrated the fact that the GLOBE is here to stay and its policy will continue to be, as in the past, independent in all things, neutral in nothing. It will continue to work for the best interests of Condon and tilliam county and in this effort it invites the cooperation and support of all citizens.

House Burned.

The residence of W. B. Kinley was almost totally destroyed by fire at about 7 o'clock Saturday evening. The alarm was given promptly and the fire department was on the ground in short notice. Excellent work was done by the hose team and in less time than is required to tell the story two streams were playing on the building and while it was impossible to save the building or contents the blaze was kept in such subjection that other nearby buildings were not in danger at any time. The fire started from a gasoline lamp and spread so quickly that Mr. Kinley and his family, who were in the house at the time had narrow escapes from serious injury. One small boy of the family had just gone into a neighbor's before the fire started and for awhile it was feared that he had been overcome by the flames but he soon showed up safe and sound. The loss was about \$600, \$400 of which was covered by insurance.

The special edition of the Pacific Homestead which purports to advertise the counties of central Oregon and for which farmers and business men of this county put up several thousand dollars last summer, is at hand. The GLOBE hoped this publication would be a creditable one, calculated to attract attention to the varied resources of this great section of country but it was disappointed. The paper on which the edition is printed is common, the half-tone work miserable and the paid write-ups which were perpetrated by the amateur journalists who did the leg pulling act through the different counties is still worse than the mechanical features. Information to the effect that Bill Jones is a prosperous and prominent farmer with a farm of 100 acres of which he already has 1 1/2 acres in cultivation and that Peter Havered owns a large stock farm stocked with two horses, one cow and three hogs is mighty bum stuff to send east as information to prospective settlers. It is simply ridiculous and will do the country affected more harm than good. It is evident that the object of the scheme was to boom the circulation of the Homestead rather than to help develop the counties that paid the bills. Gilliam county has four newspapers which could have done the country 1000 times more good for the money than this fake write-up has done if the people would only invest their money at home. The Homestead also took orders for job work while here and it is a comfort to home printers to know that the stuff sent out was as bum as the special issue of the paper. It is understood that part of it was never delivered, the parties who ordered it refusing to receive it at any price.
