Prohibition Vote Not Legal.

A meeting of the county court was held Saturday to canvass the vote cast at the recent election on the prohibition question, as required by law, and, if found correct, to issue an order forbidding the sale of intoxicating liquors in the county after January 1, 1905. After a careful canvass of the proceedings leading up to the placing of the question on the ballot it was decided by a unanimous vote of the court that no legal notice of the election had been given and the vote was illegal so far as the prohibition question is concerned in this county. This being the situation no order was made to put prohibition in effect.

The law provides that this question may be placed on the ballot only by an order of the county court which must be made in response to a petition signed by 10 per cent. of the legal voters of the county. This petition was circulated and properly signed but for some reason it was not presented to the county court at its regular September session but was later submitted to the county judge in chambers. The judge, not wishing to shut out the petitioners arbitrarily, although doubting the legality of the proceeding, made the order giving notice of the election and the question was placed on the ballot. The question was raised, however, as to the right of the county judge to grant a petition of this nature without the sanction of the commissioners and after securing the best legal advice possible it was decided that the proceedings were not regular and that the election would not stand. It is not known at this time whether the prohibitionists will carry the matter to a higher court but it is hardly likely that they will do so.

Trouble at Ajax.

The Ajax country is said to be in a condition almost bordering on warfare. Within the last few weeks 22 homestead claims have been contested and no one can tell where the trouble will stop or what will be the result of the mess already stirred up. Many of the settlers of that section are young men who are obliged to leave their claims at intervals to earn money on which to live while improving their places, but the settlers claim that all have been complying with the law as nearly as it is possible to do. It is alleged that a resident of that neighborhood and a lawyer at The Dalles are at the bottom of the trouble and that for a consideration they induce strangers who are looking for cheap land to believe that all that is necessary to secure a farm is to contest some other man's claim and take his land away from him. The settlers are of the opinion, however, that the would be land grabbers have tackled a bigger job than they can handle. A gentleman who was in from that neighborhood the other day intimated that things were liable to be doing out there most any time and that some sensational developments might be expected. The settlers are considerable worked up over the matter for, while they claim they have no fears of losing their land, the expense of fighting a contest will be considerable and many of them can ill afford to meet such expenses at a time when they need every dollar they can earn with which to improve their claims.

Ralston.

D. W. Ralston, a well known resident of Mayville, died at that place Sunday evening, of pneumonia, after an illness of about a week. Mr. Ralston had resided in this county about 5 years and was engaged in the business of buying, feeding and shipping stock and in this capacity had dealings with almost every farmer and stockman in the county and among all his acquaintances and business associates he was highly respected. He was born in Bourbon county, Kansas, January 7, 1845 and was almost 60 years old at the time of his death. He was first married in 1865 to Mrs. Martha Stevenson and as a result of their union five children were born, three sons and two daughters. His wife died a few years ago and on December 23, 1903, he was married to Mrs. E. L. Taylor, of Fossil, who survives him. He was a member of Mayville lodge, No. 81, I. O. O. F. and the funeral services were conducted by that order at Mayville, Monday afternoon, the address being delivered by Rev. Edward Curran, of this city. The remains were taken to Arlington Tuesday for shipment to his former home at Sheridan, Yamhill Co. where interment was made yesterday.
