NOTICE OF SURVEY.

To Geo. Flanders, T. C. Keizer, W. L. S. Keizer, F. M. Brown, C. A. Brown, E. G. Parry, C. A. Vincent, L. H. McDaniel, A. J. McDaniel, Chas. Parry, John Flett and Geo. Flett.

I am called upon to make a survey of the lands in sections 31 and 32, Tp. 28 S., Range 22 E., W. M., and sections 5 and 6, Tp. 3 S., Range 22 E., W. M., which requires the subdivision of these sections, the location of the corners thereof, and the restoring of the lost corners of these sections, if any.

Under the Oregon law all land holders who are affected by any survey must pay a proportionate part of the survey according to their respective interests.

You are hereby notified that said survey will begin at the S. W. corner of section 32, Tp. 2 S., Range 22 E., W. M., Tuesday, Jan. 3, 1905, at 9 o'clock A. M.

Should bad weather, or other cause, prevent the survey from beginning at the hour named, then, in such case, the survey will begin as soon thereafter as circumstances will permit.

It is necessary, for the purpose of this survey, that all the section corners and all of the 1/4 corners be in place, and if they are not, they are missing, obliterated, or lost, and must be restored, if possible, on the identical spot where they were located by the government surveyors.

All landholders in sections 28, 29, 30 and 32, Tp. 2 S., R. 22 E., W. M. and all landholders in sections 4, 7, 8 and 9, Tp. 3 S., R. 22 E., W. M., will be affected by this survey if any of the corners in the first four sections named are lost or obliterated, and such landholders will hereby take notice of this survey.

A stone set up at the corner of a fence or under the fence cannot be taken as a known corner. It must have the distinguishing marks of the U. S. survey upon it in order to be accepted as an authentic corner.

Some persons take it upon themselves to bury a corner stone. No one has any authority to do this and such corners are to be treated with suspicion.

The county surveyor is authorized to take evidence, in regard to the locus of missing corners, when reduced to writing, and to consider line fences, or any other well established land mark, when not in conflict with better evidence. The locating of a missing corner by the field notes and measurements may throw your fences all on your neighbors. Therefore, the importance of producing evidence to show the true site of a missing corner.
