HELD WITHOUT BAIL

Thompson, Who Killed Goerick, Awaits Circuit Court.

MURDER IN SECOND DEGREE

Assistant Cook Smith Gives Some Very Damaging Evidence.

Deputy District Attorney John A. Collier, of Fossil, came over last Thursday to hear the evidence of Smith, the assistant cook at the railroad camp, concerning the killing of Alec Goerick the cook stabbed by Joe Thompson, one of the contractors, a full account of which appeared in our last issue, and for which Thompson was held on a charge of manslaughter in the sum of \$7,500 bail. After hearing Smith's story the prosecuting attorney changed the charge to that of murder in the second degree when Thompson's attorneys, Messrs. Bowerman & Snover, demanded a preliminary hearing for the defendant and the same was proceeded with Friday forenoon before Justice of the peace Geo. L. Neale. Smith was the only witness examined at the hearing the evidence of witnesses who had testified at the coroner's inquest being accepted by both the state and the defense. Smith's story was substantially as follows: Goerick was cutting meat for the second table at dinner and Smith was arranging the table for the meal when Thompson entered the room. Thompson asked Smith why he had not put barrels under the eaves to catch rain water and Smith did not answer him, supposing that Thompson had been drinking and not wanting to have trouble with him. Thompson repeated the question to Smith three times and still getting no answer turned to Goerick and repeated the question to him. Goerick replied that they did not have time, laying down the knife with which he had been working as he spoke and turned around. Thompson began abusing Goerick and picking up another butcher knife began hacking over Goerick's shoulders with the knife, twice drew the knife back as though to stab Goerick but each time stopping his hand before the knife reached him. After more flourishes he again drew back and this time plunged the knife into Goerick's body. Smith then left the tent and said he remained away until after Thompson left the camp. The story was told with an apparent air of sincerity and at its conclusion Justice Neale held the defendant to circuit court without bail.
