Taken to Portland.

About a dozen persons from the Fossil country were passengers on the north bound stages Friday morning enroute to Portland where they were summoned to appear as witnesses before the federal grand jury to give evidence in the investigation now being made into the affairs of the Butte Creek Land, Livestock & Lumber Co., as they are connected with the acquisition and fencing of public lands. Among those who went down as witnesses were: Clyde Glass, Light Morris, Thompson Scoggins, Bud Brown, Bill Hawk, Clyde Brown, Ed Baker Smith, Jas. King, Jim Johnson and some others whose names we did not learn. The families of some of the men who live in the timber east and north of Fossil drove to this city to say goodbye to their husbands, fathers and sons while the stages were being changed and a big crowd of Condon people were on hands to see the travelers. Three stages were run out of here that morning to accommodate the unusual exodus of travelers and the stage company thereby reaped a pretty good harvest. Several more persons from the same neighborhood went through Saturday morning presumably going on the same errand.

Stockholders of New Bank.

The following gentlemen are understood to have subscribed for stock in the new national bank to be opened here in the spring and of which Messrs. W. Lord and F. T. Hurlburt are the promoters:

John C. Almsworth, president of the United States National Bank, of Portland; J. W. French, president of French & Co's. Bank, of The Dalles; A. Bush, president of Ladd & Bush's Bank, of Salem; B. F. Allen, president of First National Bank, of Prineville; L. Latimer, of Portland; Grant Wade, of Olex; W. Lord and F. T. Hurlburt. In addition to these two or three local business men will, it is understood, take stock in the institution. The fact that so many prominent financiers have been interested in a Condon project is evidence that this city stands high in the estimation of conservative business men in all parts of the state.

Woodmen Entertain.

A most delightful evening was spent by the members of the local Woodmen camp in the lodge room in Armory hall last Thursday evening when the neighbors entertained the members of the circle and a number of invited guests with a social and luncheon. A highly entertaining program of musical selections and recitations was rendered by some of Condon's best local talent and the lunch served was at once substantial and dainty. Train Held Up.

The Spokane Flyer, one of the crack trains on the O. R. & N., was held up and a half dozen of the passengers were robbed within the city limits of Portland last Saturday evening. Just after the train left the East side station and was slowly climbing the grade up Sullivan's gulch, four masked men entered the smoking compartment of the rear sleeper and held up six occupants securing about \$100. One of the passengers who wore a handsome diamond asked the robber who started to take it off to leave it as it was a gift from his dead mother and the robber replied, "all right" and promptly returned it. The

holdups explained to their victims that they were hungry and wanted money to procure food which they gave as the reason for their desperate act. After securing the money the men compelled the Pullman conductor to stop the train and jumping off they quickly disappeared in the darkness.

C. A. Devens, of this city, was on the train but being in another coach missed most of the real sensation of the hold up.

Obituary.

Clarence Andrew Neel, son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Neel, of near Lone Rock, and a brother of Jeff Neel, of this city, died in a hospital at Portland last Sunday morning after having undergone an operation on the previous day for appendicitis. He suffered from an attack of typhoid fever a few weeks ago from which paralysis of the bowels and appendicitis resulted and as a last resource he was taken to the hospital for an operation, with above results.

Deceased was 22 years old and leaves a widow and one baby daughter. He was a general favorite among his many friends and acquaintances and his untimely end will be sincerely mourned by all who knew him. The remains were brought to Heppner for burial which took place yesterday afternoon.

Pulliam.

John W. Pullman, an old resident of Ferry Canyon precinct, died last Friday morning of pneumonia, aged 53 years. Mr. Pullman was born in the state of Kentucky and lived for some time in Washington before coming to Oregon some eight years ago. His illness was of short duration, lasting but one week. He is survived by a widow and one son, L. S. Pulliam. The funeral was held Saturday afternoon, interment being in Mt. Moriah cemetery at this place.

Likes Alberta.

J. H. Downing received a letter Saturday from his son J. M. Downing, who is now a resident of Alberta, Canada. Mr. Downing is in the stock business there but has lately left his ranch and moved to the town of Olds where he is now engaged in the livery and feed business. He says the snow has never been more than two or three inches deep this winter and while the mercury sometimes drops to 25 or 30 below zero the weather has generally been pleasant. Both Mr. and Mrs. Downing are well pleased with their new home.

Land Fraud Cases.

Investigation of land fraud cases at Portland is slow this week because of the illness of prosecutor Heney. The Telegram says that indictments are expected to be returned against W. W. Stewer, H. H. Hendricks and Cant. Zachary, of the Butte Creek Company, and the Journal predicts that at the April term of federal court many men high in social and political life, will be required to make a fight for liberty and reputation and that land methods will be thoroughly investigated.

Lone Rock.

J. B. Goff went to The Dalles Monday as a witness in some land cases.

A deep sadness was cast over this community Sunday morning by the news that Clarence Neel of this place had died in Portland.

Justice Goff's court was set grinding last Thursday on the case of the State vs. Cyrus Bennett for larceny from a building. J. A. Collier of Fossil represented the State while attorneys J. W. Snover of Condon and A. B. Stanley of Lone Rock defended the accused. After hearing the testimony of the state's witnesses, the defendant waived his right and did not call his witnesses in the case. Attorney Snover gave the court a lively speech on motion to dismiss, but was checkmated by the State's attorney. After reviewing the State's evidence and as the defendant made no efforts toward proof or explanation, the court held him for the circuit court in \$250 bonds.

A company composed of O. A. Brown, Wayne Grider, B. Froman, U. S. Carline, F. M. Shannon, Wm. Campbell and Charlie Gross was organized last week to purchase a fine stallion which was shipped here from the east. The animal is an imported Clyde, six years old, and weighs 1750 pounds.
