THE WATER QUESTION.

During the past month or two considerable undesirable notoriety has been attached to Condon on account of certain misleading rumors which have gained currency regarding an alleged shortage of the city's water supply. People from the outside tell us that the report has been industriously circulated that the city is "up against it" for water and that even drinking water is at a premium. Up until this time this paper has chosen to ignore all such senseless and childish stories believing that they would collapse from their own sheer flimsiness. It may, however, be proper to publicly state at this time the exact facts regarding the water question.

The city's present water supply is drawn from two wells, the power for pumping being furnished by gasoline engines. The present system was put in almost six years ago when the town was only a small village and it was never intended nor expected that it would supply water for all purposes for such a town as Condon has now grown to be. Up until the present time, however, it has done so and practically all the water used for domestic use, watering stock, irrigation, producing steam and for fire protection has been drawn from the city reservoir. It was known last Summer that more water would be needed for the present year than the old plant could possibly furnish and it was also known that a new plant would necessarily be provided. But such enterprises cost money and before sufficient money could be raised it was necessary to go to the legislature for a new charter giving the city authority to issue water bonds to an amount sufficient to construct and equip an adequate plant. This was done and as soon as the matter could be legally arranged an election was held at which the proposition was submitted and carried almost unanimously of bonding the city for \$30,000 for the purpose of constructing water works. The city council has decided to sink a well 8 or 10 inches in diameter to a depth of 1000 feet if necessary to procure an adequate supply of water for all purposes. They are now negotiating with several different parties with a view to getting the best contract possible for the completion of the work and it is probable that the matter will be arranged and work commenced at an early date. But this is an important matter and all these details require time.

Men who are familiar with the water question here have no doubt but that with a deep well drill and plenty of means to go down an ample supply of water will be secured. Since the town was started scores of wells have been sunk within the city limits and in only one case have they failed to strike water. The deepest well in the city is about 200 feet and only a six inch hole. That well has for the past two years supplied most of the water for the city water system.

The authorities are going ahead with this matter and every citizen should stand behind them and give them time to do the work and do it right. And in the meantime whenever a stranger comes in who has met the outside knocker and been made to believe that Condon is a dry town so far as aqua pura is concerned, explain the situation

to him and then take him to the nearest hydrant and give him all he can drink of the coldest, purest and most sparkling water to be found anywhere between the summit of the Rocky mountains and Mt. Hood.

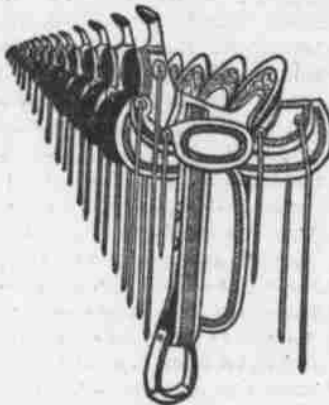
