Only a few days ago the little town of Echo, in Umatilla county, gave its annual picnic and the railroad people not only gave a cheap excursion rate over their lines for the occasion but in addition to this they took out from Portland two cars loaded with business men and prominent visitors as the guests of the railroad company. A day was spent at the Echo picnic and another day was devoted to giving the guests a drive through the wheat farms, alfalfa fields and stock ranches of the Butter creek valley in order to give them an insight into the possibilities and resources of that portion of the Inland Empire. Condon should do as well as Echo has done and it can if its people will take hold and co-operate in working up a celebration.

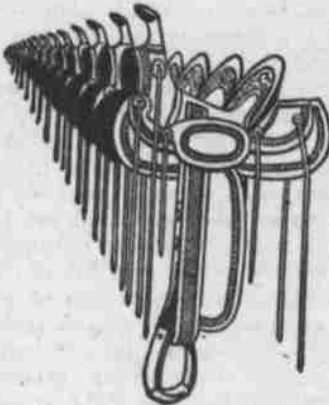
