Railroad Is Here.

The railroad is here. Tuesday was the great day of its arrival and at about 4:30 in the afternoon Condon ceased to be the unimportant inland place of former years, whose only connection with the big outside world was supplied by a telephone wire, a stage line, and the cumbersome freight wagon of pioneer days and suddenly bloomed forth as one of the important cities of Oregon; railway terminal, supply point for a vast interior country and destined to become, within the next two years, the most important local wheat market in Oregon.

During the afternoon the track-laying outfit which includes two big locomotives ten material cars, a modern steam track-laying machine and a crew of perhaps 75 men, steamed slowly up the grade just north of the city limits and the last half mile of track was soon laid. Nearly the entire population of the town, men, women and children were out to bid the iron horse a hearty welcome and when the line which marks the city limits was reached and crossed prolonged blasts from the engines which pull and push the construction train, was responded to by every steam whistle in the city making the welcome at once hearty and unanimous.

The new Arlington-Condon railway is said by men who are familiar with such matters, to be the best constructed branch line ever built in Oregon. The grade is most substantially constructed, the bridges and culverts are first-class and the steel and ties are as good as are in use on many main line roads.

Actual construction work was begun September 13, 1904 and has since been vigorously prosecuted. Considerable work yet remains to be done in the Condon yards and along the line putting on the finishing touches and it may be a month before a regular train service can be established. This, however, does not alter the fact that the advent of the first railway locomotive within the city limits of Condon dates from May 30, 1905.
