If these men are innocent of wrongdoing the trials should and no doubt will, fully vindicate them and clear their reputations of any shadow of suspicion. If, on the other hand they are guilty of defrauding a government—which they have so often in the enthusiasm of a political campaign held up to the dear people as the most glorious and beneficent government on the face of the earth—of its public lands, all fair minded people will agree that they should be punished as surely and, at least, as severely, as would some poor devil who had stolen a spavined cayuse or a maverick calf. The fact that these men occupy high positions should not shield them any more than should the act of the Montana judge who recently apparently made a farce of justice by sentencing a wealthy cattleman, who had been convicted of taking unlawful privileges with the public domain, to three hours imprisonment when he perhaps deserved more than that many years, be taken as a criterion for the guidance of the federal court in the Oregon district.

First Dam by Jumbo; 2nd Dam by George Washington. Both sire and dams are of the large Mammoth stock of Jacks and Jennets.

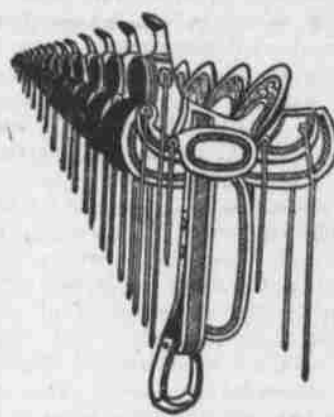
