POVERTY IN THE UNITED STATES.

"There are probably in fairly prosperous years no fewer than 10,000,000 persons in poverty in the United States; that is to say, underfed, underclothed, and poorly housed," says Robert Hunter in "Poverty." "Of these about 4,000,000 persons are public paupers. Over 2,000,000 workmen are unemployed from four to six months in the year. About 500,000 male immigrants arrive yearly and seek work in the very districts where unemployment is greatest. Nearly half the families in the country are propertyless. Over 1,700,000 little children are forced to become wage earners when they should still be in school. About 3,000,000 women find it necessary to work and about 2,000,000 are employed in factories and mills. Probably no fewer than 1,000,000 workers are injured or killed each year while doing their work, and about 10,000,000 of the persons now living will, if the present ratio is kept up, die of the preventable disease, tuberculosis."

A few years ago Jacob A. Riis collected figures which showed that about one-third of the people of New York City were dependent upon charity at some time during the eight years previous to 1890. The New York State Board of Charities reported that 29 per cent of the people of the State of New York in 1897 found it necessary to apply for relief. In the Borough of Manhattan 60,403 families were evicted from their homes in 1903. This is about 14 per cent of the total number of families. During the year 1903 in Boston over 136,000 persons, or 20 per cent of the population, were aided by the public authorities alone. It is estimated that 336,000 persons were aided through private charities. And there are only about 606,000 persons in Boston.

Thirty-four per cent of the farmers in this country are renters and nearly 19 per cent of the farms are mortgaged. The census for 1900 shows that more than half the families in the United States do not own their homes. An astonishing fact is that the property of the nation is so divided that one family in every 100 owns more property than is owned by all the remaining ninety-nine.

CIRCUIT COURT ORDER.

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Gilliam County.

State of Oregon, plaintiff,

vs.

F. B. Stevens, Administrator of the Estate of George Moore, deceased, and all heirs of said deceased, if any there be, and all persons interested in said estate, defendants.

Now at this time is presented the information in the above entitled cause of Frank Menefer, District Attorney of the Seventh Judicial District of the State of Oregon, from which it appears to the court:

That George Moore died in the State of California, on or about the 21st day of February, 1905, intestate and without heirs and left an estate in Gilliam County, Oregon, that F. B. Stevens is the duly appointed, qualified and acting administrator of the estate of said deceased and, as such administrator, has settled and closed said estate and has filed his final report in the county court in said county and state.

That, after settlement of all of the claims, charges and expenses against said estate, including the expenses of settling and closing the same, said administrator now has in his hands and possession, belonging to said estate, the sum of \$6211.59 in money, and said sum is all of the property remaining on hands and belonging to said estate.

That the State of Oregon has right by law to all the property of said deceased.

Now, therefore, in the name of the State of Oregon: You, the said defendant, F. B. Stevens administrator of the estate as aforesaid, and all heirs of said George Moore, deceased, if any there be, and all persons interested in said estate, are hereby notified to be and appear in the Circuit court-room in the County court-house in Condon, Gilliam County, Oregon, on or before Monday, the 7th day of August, 1905, then and there to show cause, if any there be, while the title to all of the property belonging to the estate of said George Moore, deceased, to-wit, the sum of \$6211.59 now on hands and in the hands of the administrator of said estate, should not be vested in the State of Oregon.
