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The Portland Fair.

The writer recently spent several days at the big fair at Portland and takes pleasure in saying that the exhibition is well worth the time, trouble and expense which it entails. Every one who can possibly do so should take advantage of this opportunity of seeing the greatest exhibit of useful, beautiful and curious things ever collected in one spot in western America. Nature has done much for the Lewis and Clark Fair, the location being one of natural beauty, which perhaps could not be equalled within the boundaries of any city in America. The exhibit of Oregon products in the agricultural, forestry and mining buildings are a revelation to the thousands of eastern visitors who throng the grounds day after day and the same may be said of the exhibits from California, Washington and Idaho. The last named state has a particularly fine display in interior decorations the entire inside effect being produced from native grains and grasses. The government exhibit is very fine. To many western people who have not visited the big eastern World's fairs it is perhaps the most interesting of all. Every department of the national government is represented. In the treasury department a massive minting machine such as is used in coining 20-dollar gold pieces, is at work coining souvenir medals for visitors, in the army and navy departments models of all the latest improved fighting machines may be seen and so on through all the departments. The Alaska and Philippine exhibits are interesting as are also the government display in the irrigation and forestry building. The "Trail" is a motley conglomeration gathered from all parts of the earth containing some very good shows and some very poor ones but all seem to gather in the dimes and two-bit pieces and that is what they are there for.

Modern Hotel for Condon.

Portland parties were here during the week securing a location for a first-class hotel for Condon. The negotiations are being looked after through the firm of Bowerman & Snover and it is understood that the deal is practically closed for the location. The gentleman interested are practical hotel men and they have announced their attention of erecting a brick building of strictly modern pattern and of ample size to handle the rapidly growing transient business of the town. The building will be 100 feet square and three stories in height and will be equipped with all the modern conveniences of a first-class hostelry.

While the present hotel accommodations have, until recently, been ample for the town, the present rapid increase in population and transient business makes a larger and more modern hotel building a necessity. It is understood that work will be commenced on the building at an early date. The new building and furnishings will cost from \$20,000 to \$25,000.
