Senator Mitchell Sentenced.

In the federal court at Portland Tuesday morning Judge DeHaven pronounced sentence on Senator John H. Mitchell who was recently found guilty of illegally receiving fees for expediting fraudulent land cases before the general land office while a United States senator. The sentence was that the defendant shall pay a fine of \$2000 and suffer imprisonment in the penitentiary for a term of six months. At the time the jury found the senator guilty a recommendation of mercy was made to the court and it has been generally believed that Judge DeHaven would make the punishment of the aged senator nominal, at least as regarded the feature of imprisonment. Senator Thurston, as attorney for Senator Mitchell filed a bill of exceptions and the case will be taken to the supreme court of the United States. A bond in the sum of \$2000 was given for Mitchell's appearance before the higher court.

The case should be decided in the supreme court within a year and until that time Mr. Mitchell can continue to draw his salary as United States senator.

Superintendent's Report.

From a recent report rendered by County School Superintendent McArthur, we glean the following information:

There are now in the county, between the ages of 4 and 20 years, 1285 persons, 688 males and 597 females. Of this number 975, 493 males and 482 females, have attended school during the past year. The number of persons of school age who did not attend school during the past year was 310, of these 195 were males and 215 were females.

There are 34 regularly organized school districts of which 31 have school houses. The average length of term of school is 4 1/2 months.

The financial statement shows the school fund to be in good condition with a balance on hand of \$6,210.94.
