A WORD FOR CONDON.

A gentleman who quiet recently returned from a visit to Umatilla county says Condon is the best town and shows more lively business conditions than any town he visited during his trip. While Pendleton, Weston and other towns in the big wheat county are all right they do not show the healthy trade condition that Condon does and the two places named are suffering from a decided shortage of water. This fact should be considered by people at home or abroad who are disposed to "knock" Condon on the water question and these people should remember that the only trouble with Condon is that the town has taken on such an unprecedented growth that it simply grew away from the present water system. Condon still has water in plenty for domestic use and for other needs except a shortage just now for irrigation purposes and work is being prosecuted for an increased supply commensurate with the present and future needs of the city, with money in the treasury to pay for the work.

Rome was not built in a day nor was Portland's Bull run water system completed in a week, and we respectfully request the "knockers" to "bide a wee" and keep cool.

It may be remarked in passing that even Portland with its unexcelled water system, drawing its supply from the snow-capped glaciers of Mount Hood, has been suffering to some extent from a water famine during the present season because Portland, like Condon is growing some. It might also be remarked, in re-passing, that Condon has the only water supply in this section of the state that equals if not excels the Bull run fluid.

Condon is not athirst.

Condon is not a "dead one."

Condon is alive and up-to-date and every day she is "getting there Eli" with "both feet."

THE TIME IS TOO SHORT.

A few of the land thieves who have robbed Oregon of her rich timber lands will be punished. The great majority of them will escape scot free, owing to the bar of the statute of limitations. The lapse of three years without prosecution after the commission of the crime suffices to render the prisoner immune and it frequently happens that more than that time passes before the evidence comes to light which will justify legal action.

The period of limitation is too short. In few states is the time so brief within which lawbreakers may be brought to bar for their crimes. Some limitation must be imposed, for it is contrary to public policy to allow punishment to be indefinitely delayed. But a law which bars prosecutions after a lapse of only three years is an encouragement to such crimes as the stealing of public lands, for in such cases detection rarely comes until months, or perhaps years have passed.

The land grabber has been able

to carry on his frauds with a reasonable confidence that before the slow-moving machinery of the law could be set in motion against him the statute would have run and prosecution would be barred. For the past three years the government has been probing into the land frauds but so tedious has been the work of gathering evidence that in the vast majority of cases detection came too late for punishment.

The latest indictment by a federal grand jury in this city affords an illustration. It charges a conspiracy to secure through fraud some of the richest timber lands in the state and thousands of acres were taken up by members of the ring. Three years ago the government began the investigation of the conspiracy, but not until last week; when the statute of limitations had all but run, was an indictment finally returned.

There would be a much more wholesome fear of the law if the period of limitation were extended to five years.—Portland Journal.

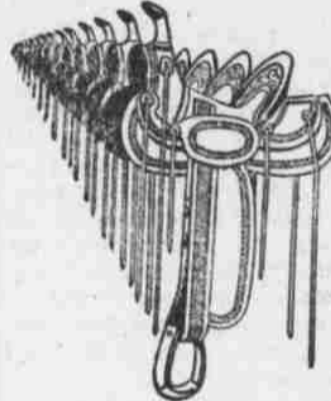
