**THANKSGIVING.**

Today in most of the churches of America the people will gather to return thanks to Divine Power for the manifold material blessings with which we have as a nation and as individuals been visited during the past year. As a people, those of us who are more or less comfortably situated and who attend church today, we will be thankful—in words—for national prosperity, for national greatness, for our national standing as a world power and for having escaped in great measure serious visitations of famine, pestilence and war. These and other matters have been mentioned on so many similar occasions during the past decades that we sometimes wonder if they have not become a sort of mechanical thanksgiving somewhat like the praying machines of the Chinese—a sort of lip service that is indulged in because it has always been considered through many generations, as the correct thing to do on the last Thursday in November before sitting down to our annual dinner of turkey and cranberries.

While it is no doubt well that as individuals, we should appreciate and be thankful for material prosperity—providing always that such has come to us through legitimate and morally right methods—this writer believes that in our churches today will gather many thoughtful, candid men and women who will seriously ask themselves whether as a nation we have actual cause for thanksgiving along the stereotyped lines of thought that have so much prevailed in the past.

What matters it if we are the greatest nation on earth today if our strength is not expended in the direction of extending civilization, education, liberty and happiness to all classes of our citizens? What matters it if some of our citizens are enjoying the greatest wave of prosperity that ever swept the earth if thousands of their fellows are hungry, homeless, workless and depending on charity for a crust or a bowl of soup for their Thanksgiving dinner? Is it to our national credit that we should tell Omnipotence today how thankful we are that Rockefeller's dividends from Standard Oil amount to more than \$20,000,000 for the year while his wagon drivers in Chicago work long hours for a daily wage of \$2? Within the week these men have, by a carefully prepared statement, shown the Standard's Chicago manager that after practicing the most rigid economy, it costs them \$1.97 a day to support their families, leaving them the munificent sum of 3 cents a day for sickness, accidents, entertainment, Thanksgiving turkey and the savings bank. The manager was frank in his reply—almost brutally so—for while he admitted that no family could be properly supported on

such a wage he stated that he could fill the place of every man in his employ at a day's notice from the ranks of the unemployed at the \$2 rate. Will the Almighty be pleased with our paeans of praise because of augmented bank accounts when today 300,000 miserable coal miners are on the verge of a great strike because of a proposed cut in their wages to a starvation figure?

But there is a brighter side. From a moral or ethical viewpoint we have much real cause for true, heart-service thanksgiving. Never before in the history of our country has so much been done within a twelvemonth for the moral advancement of our nation. Political bosses, reeking in their own rottenness, insurance plunderers, secure behind fortunes which they have wrung from policy holders, trust magnates, land sharks; timber thieves—despoilers of the people, every one—have during the past year been flushed from cover and, in the open, many of them have been tried and convicted for crimes that a year or so ago were winked at and condoned. These things are real causes for thanksgiving, showing as they do an aroused public sentiment for civic righteousness, a new era in the enforcement of law and a brighter prospect for the true welfare of every citizen whether he be of high or low degree. For these things then let us all return thanks.
