WOMAN AND SUFFRAGE.

The whole country rings with praises of our eminent men; statues are erected in their honor, books are devoted to the history of their lives, men, women and children bow down and worship them, but how few there are who lift the curtain and worship the real hero—the one who has made this greatness possible—the American mother. What higher ideal, what more sacred trust, what greater factor for good or for evil could exist than that of motherhood? The great moral and intellectual school of American citizenship is the home, in that home the mother is the teacher. She has the care, the nurture and training of her offspring. The foundation for a good or a bad character is laid during the boyhood or girlhood days. If the child be a boy he will sometime be a voter. If his mother was a woman of good character and inculcated the goodness of her heart and the soundness of her mind into that of her child she could rest assured that when that child reached his majority and was called upon to cast his ballot it would not only be cast upon the right side of every moral question, but no law would receive his sanction that was opposed to the interests of women. We often speak of the laws upon our statute books as "man-made laws" but this is hardly correct, they are "mother-made laws." The men who sit in the legislative halls today enacting laws are but voicing the sentiment of their early training. If that training has been neglected, fair and just laws could hardly be expected. Of course there are exceptions to the foregoing statement but we were speaking of the general rule rather than of the exceptions. We believe that the sentiment of the majority of American mothers is voiced in the words of a Condon woman who, when broached upon the subject of equal suffrage replied: "I cannot say a word in its favor. I have raised four sons to vote for me."

The fact that Judge Wm. R. Ellis of Pendleton is an Eastern Oregon man, together with the fact that he has, with much credit to himself and to this Congressional district, served the people of Oregon in the lower house of Congress in times past, should give him a strong following in all Eastern Oregon counties. While serving the people of Oregon at Washington the Judge made many friends among both the members of the House and the Senate. Many of these friends are still in Congress and, with the following which the Judge already has at Washington, he could doubtless do more for the people of Eastern Oregon and the state at large than any other candidate who is seeking the nomination.

PROCLAMATION.

Whereas the secretary of state of Oregon, has notified me in writing that pursuant to the provisions of an act entitled, "an act making effective the initiative and referendum provisions of section 1 of article 4 of the constitution of the state of Oregon, and regulating elections thereunder, and providing penalties for violations of provisions of this act," approved February 24, 1903, the People's Power League of Oregon, duly filed in his office on February 3, 1906, an initiative petition containing 8542 signatures properly attached to a copy of said measure certified in accordance with law, demanding that a proposed amendment to article 4 of the constitution of the state of Oregon, to be designated in the constitution as section 1A of article 4 of said constitution, shall be submitted to the legal voters of the state of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the general election to be held in said state on the 14th day of June, being the first Monday in June, 1906, designated by said People's Power League of Oregon as "Constitutional amendment for the initiative and referendum on local, special and municipal laws and parts of laws," which said proposed amendment is hereinafter particularly set forth.

Now, therefore, I, Geo. E. Chamberlain, governor of the state of Oregon, in obedience to the provisions of said act hereinbefore first mentioned, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the state of Oregon, announcing that the People's Power League of Oregon has filed said initiative petition with the requisite number of signatures thereto attached, demanding that there be submitted to the legal voters of the state of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the regular election to be held on the 14th day of June, 1906, said day being the first Monday in said month, a proposed amendment to article 4 of the constitution of the state of Oregon, to be designated in the constitution as section 1A of article 4 of said constitution, designated by said People's Power League of Oregon as "Constitutional amendment for the initiative and referendum on local, special and municipal laws and parts of laws," which said proposed amendment is as follows:

"Article 4 of the constitution of the state of Oregon shall be and hereby is amended by inserting the following section in said article 4 after section 1 and before section 2, and it shall be designated in the constitution as section 1A of article 4:

"Section 1A. The referendum may be demanded by the people against one or more items, sections or parts of any act of the legislative assembly in the same manner in which such power may be exercised against a complete act. The filing of a referendum petition against one or more items, sections or parts of an act shall not delay the remainder of that act from becoming operative. The initiative and referendum powers reserved to the people of this constitution are hereby further reserved to the legal voters of every municipality and district as to all local, special and municipal legislation of every character in or for their respective municipalities and districts. The manner of exercising said powers shall be prescribed by general laws, except that cities and towns may provide for the manner of exercising the initiative and referendum powers as to their municipal legislation. Not more than ten per cent of the legal voters may be required to order the referendum, nor more than fifteen per cent to propose any measure by the initiative in any city or town."
