CITY ELECTION

Both Factions Make a Hard Fight

Not for a good many years has there been such a lively interest taken in our city election as there was last Monday. There were two tickets in the field. Edward Dunn was endorsed for Mayor by both tickets and Elgin Myers also had the endorsement of both factions for city councilman. The first ticket was as follows: Dr. Mann, Edgar Moore and Tom Johnson. The second ticket had for its standard bearers, Dr. J. F. Wood, Chas. Brown and Frank Plitter. When the ballots were counted it was found that Dr. Mann had defeated Chas. Brown by the small margin of two votes. Edgar Moore won out over Dr. Wood by six votes. Tom Johnson received 106 votes and Frank Plitter 80. The candidacy of Mr. Plitter was hurt considerably by the rumor which gained general circulation on Monday that he would decline to serve if elected. Elgin Myers received 145 votes, the highest number cast for city councilmen. Edward Dunn had no opposition for Mayor and was re-elected. There were nearly 200 votes cast in all. The fight against the candidates themselves but against "bossism" in municipal politics. Every candidate on both tickets was a conservative business man of high standing among his fellow townsmen and the citizens of Condon have every reason to believe that the new councilmen and mayor will well and faithfully perform the duties of their respective offices.
