It is now conceded by every man familiar with the situation in the Second Congressional District, that William R. Ellis will receive a majority in practically every county. Reports which have been received here during the past week give the Pendleton man the lead in Eastern Oregon, and the indications in Umatilla and Morrow are that he will get more votes in those two counties than all the other candidates will receive. In the down river counties the popular Judge has developed great strength during the past week, and the workingmen along the river are working like Trojans to give him a big majority.—Portland Labor Press. The Portland Labor Press, the official paper of the Oregon State Federation of Labor and the reputed spokesman for the laboring men of the state, has been the enthusiastic supporter of the candidacy of Judge Ellis since the beginning of his campaign. The laboring men as well as the business men of the Second Congressional District recognize in Judge Ellis a man of great ability, a man who will deal fair and square with all classes, rich and poor alike. He will favor no class, no faction and if nominated and elected will accomplish something for the people of Oregon and the Second Congressional District.

If the farmers of Gilliam county were always as sure of having a good crop of wheat as they are of having a good crop of candidates for public office, there would be no end to their future prosperity.

One noticeable feature in connection with the new primary law is the fact that the professional politicians and "wire pullers" are unable to forecast with any degree of certainty the result of the primary election on this 20th day of April. This fact alone furnishes the best evidences that the new law, although perhaps defective in parts, has served its purpose. The law was aimed at "boss rule". The aim and purpose of its champions was to take from the hands of the professional politician the power of making the nominations for political office and placing that power in the hands of the people. The most ardent supporters of the law could not expect it to accomplish its entire purpose but they do believe that it will prove a valuable check to the power and prestige of "bossism".

If the defeated candidate had the same "glad hand" and the same beaming smile after the election as he did the few weeks before, everyone would love him.

PROCLAMATION.

Whereas the secretary of state of the state of Oregon, has notified me in writing that pursuant to the provisions of an act entitled, "an act making effective the initiative and referendum provisions of section 1 of article 4 of the constitution of the state of Oregon, and regulating elections thereunder, and providing penalties for violations of provisions of this act," approved February 24, 1905, the People's Power League of Oregon, duly filed in his office, on February 3, 1906, an initiative petition containing 8042 signatures properly attached to a copy of said measure certified in accordance with law, demanding that a proposed amendment to article 4 of the constitution of the state of Oregon, to be designated in the constitution as section 1A of article 4 of said constitution, shall be submitted to the legal voters of the state of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the general election to be held in said state on the 4th day of June, being the first Monday in June, 1906, designated by said People's Power League of Oregon as "Constitutional amendment for the initiative and referendum on local, special and municipal laws and parts of laws," which said proposed amendment is hereinafter particularly set forth.

Now, therefore, I, Geo. E. Chamberlain, governor of the state of Oregon, in obedience to the provisions of said act hereinbefore first mentioned, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the state of Oregon, announcing that the People's Power League of Oregon has filed said initiative petition with the requisite number of signatures thereto attached, demanding that there be submitted to the legal voters of the state of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the regular election, to be held on the 4th day of June, 1906, said day being the first Monday in said month, a proposed amendment to article 4 of the constitution of the state of Oregon, to be designated in the constitution as section 1A of article 4 of said constitution, designated by said People's Power League of Oregon as "Constitutional amendment for the initiative and referendum on local, special and municipal laws and parts of laws," which said proposed amendment is as follows:

"Article 4 of the constitution of the State of Oregon shall be and hereby is amended by inserting the following section in said article 4 after section 1 and before section 2, and it shall be designated in the constitution as section 1A of article 4:

"Section 1A. The referendum may be demanded by the people against one or more items, sections or parts of any act of the legislative assembly in the same manner in which such power may be exercised against a complete act. The filing of a referendum petition against one or more items, sections or parts of an act shall not delay the remainder of that act from becoming operative. The initiative and referendum powers reserved to the people of this constitution are hereby further reserved to the legal voters of every municipality and district as to all local, special and municipal legislation of every character in or for their respective municipalities and districts. The manner of exercising said powers shall be prescribed by general laws, except that cities and towns may provide for the manner of exercising the initiative and referendum powers as to their municipal legislation. Not more than ten per cent of the legal voters may be required to order the referendum, nor more than fifteen per cent to propose any measure by the initiative in any city or town."

Done at the capital at Salem, this 25th day of February, A. D., 1906.
