WILL GET TOGETHER

Sherman County Farmers do not Propose to be Buncoed.

The wheat growers of Sherman county have arisen in their indignation over the present exorbitant price of grain sacks and have called a general meeting for tomorrow to discuss all questions which are near to the hearts of the farmers. At this meeting the present price of sacks will be investigated and a remedy proposed for the existing evil. The advisability of establishing wheat sales days will be discussed and in all probability will be considered favorably. The matter of freight rates will also be discussed at this time. The outcome of this meeting will be watched with much interest by the wheatgrowers of this as well as other Oregon counties. The ranchers of Umatilla county have already made arrangements for wheat sales days and other counties will in all probability follow their example. At any rate an organization of the wheat-growers is a good one and will place them in a better position to demand some consideration at the hands of the buyers.

CONDON WOOL SALES

The Interior and Kerr Gifford warehouses were the scene of much activity on June 28th when nearly one million pounds of wool was disposed of to buyers. The prices ranged from 14c to 19 1/2c. The wool that was stored in the Condon warehouses was of a good quality but a great deal of it was wet. This together with the fact that there were but few buyers present and the sale day was not called until the latter part of June account for the prices that were received by the growers. Geo. Hardie's clip brought the highest price. On the whole the sale was satisfactory to the sheepmen but some of them were a little dissatisfied. Nearly all of them have given assurances, however, that they will bring their wool to Condon next year.
