As a direct result of the recent packing house disclosures Great Britain and Germany have placed a ban upon American canned meat. The appointment of new inspectors who had moral stamina enough to enforce the law would have accomplished the desired result. There are many men in both the republican and democratic parties who now see the mistake of bathing the packers before the gaze of the world when a private bath would have accomplished the same purpose.
