SALES DAY WITHOUT BUYERS.

War has been declared against the local grain buyers of Pendleton by the members of the wheat raisers association. A few weeks ago the farmers of Umatilla county perfected an organization for the purpose of advancing the interest of their members and to that end provided for wheat sale days. The first sale day was held for Thursday of last week. The ranchers were there, and their wheat was there, but the buyers were conspicuously absent. In consequence of the action of the buyers in ignoring sale day the ranchers, more determined than ever to see the plan through, set the next sale day for August 15th. Secretary Smythe promised that there would be several independent buyers at that sale and that the local buyers would be compelled to attend or lose the wheat.

NEARLY DROWNED.

The twenty two months old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. K. Andrews had a very close call last Friday evening. The child had been in the habit of playing about the barn yard while her father milked the cow in the evening and was engaged in the same pursuit Friday night when she was discovered by her father, hanging head first in a barrel of water. Dr. Wood was summoned at once and by the prompt action on the part of the doctor and the parents the child was restored to her normal state in about two hours.

FIRST WHEAT SALE.

The first wheat sale of any importance in Gilliam county took place last week when J. W. Booth of Wasco sold 18,000 bushels of wheat to the Interior Warehouse Company in this city. The price is currently reported to have been 60 cents a bushel. Mr. Booth is delivering from three to four hundred sacks a day, and some of it has already been shipped to Portland. His wheat will go over 20 bushels an acre.
