The Globe is in receipt of a complimentary copy of a neatly bound book entitled "The Packers, The Private Car Lines and The People". The name of J. Ogden Armour appears as the author. Mr. Armour devotes some 380 pages to a cunning defense of the meat trust and especially to the defense of the methods of the Armour Packing plant, of which he is the owner. A copy of this book has doubtless been placed in the hands of every editor in the United States and its contents appeared in the Saturday Evening Post some few months ago. Thus the packers attempt to stifle public opinion. That the efforts of Mr. Armour will have some effect upon the readers of his book cannot be denied but among the greater majority of its readers we have no hesitancy in making the prophecy that it will be regarded as a very weak argument in favor of a very weak cause. However the meat trust is at least entitled to a respectful hearing and the public will be better able to pass judgement upon the packers after reading both sides of the question.

Republicanism in that state is divided into two distinct factions, the "stand-patters" and the "tariff revisionists". The latter headed by Governor Cummins have succeeded in controlling the state convention and placing in nomination a complete tariff revision ticket. If the republicans choose to incorporate this plank into their platform it will be revised by the grand old party, if not it will be revised by the democratic party under the guidance of Wm. Jennings Bryan.

Gov. Geo. E. Chamberlain of Oregon is the logical candidate for the democratic nomination for vice-president two years hence says ex-United States Senator Turner of the State of Washington. The popular Oregon governor in an interview a few days ago replied that he favored the nomination of Senator Turner. Like the measles and the mumps, Alphonso and Gaston of comic supplement fame, have been allowed to run their course and had about fallen into oblivion until revised by the Washington senator and the governor of Oregon.
