According to data gathered and tabulated by the Department of Agriculture, farm land in the United States has increased in value 38.5 per cent. since 1900. The increase includes improvements. Inquiries were addressed to 45,000 state, county and township crop correspondents, and the estimated per cent. of increase is based on their reports. The department's correspondents gave more than one hundred reasons for the large increase in values. Here are a few of them: A series of good crop years, townspeople buying farms for investment, decline in the rate of interest as a result of there being an oversupply of money in the local banks, rural free delivery of mail, rural electric railroads connecting towns with cities, rural telephones, farm land now being sought as an investment by persons of means, higher prices for produce, the construction of good roads, movement of city families to acquire country homes, and improvement in cultural methods—American Farmer Journal.
